4th Grade Experiment

The fourth graders investigated why birds have different beaks. They used tools such as regular pliers, needle-nose pliers, forceps, and chop sticks to determine what foods would be best for each type of beak. They tried to crack sunflower seeds and black walnuts, pick up rice, drink juice, and pull gummy worms out of sand with each tool. When they completed the activity they decided which birds' beaks matched the tools and what foods would be best for each kind of bird because of the type of beak it possessed.



















Another fourth grade project was to take brown paper sacks and cut them in to buffalo hide shapes and then draw "winter count" pictures on them like the Native Americans did to document their life experiences.

Koch's students were tasked with the problem of building
a 3 story structure out of toothpicks and marshmallows
that would withstand a 30 second earthquake that was
produced by pounding on the tables. Several different
ideas were tried without much success. Mrs. Kemp then
showed the class a video that contained ideas to improve
their structures to make them sturdier, such as crossbars
and doubling the picks or overlapping them to increase
strength. The students then got to try again to implement
the suggestions to make better towers.

After trying different ideas, they watched a video that explained that if you rolled the paper into a cylinder shape it exponentially increased its' strength. They were thrilled when this approach worked great. The students then placed a piece of paper flat across two cups to build a bridge. They were then asked to see how many pennies they could place on it before it collapsed. After accordion folding the paper and trying again they were excited to find they were now able to hold several pennies on their bridges.

This fall seventeen freshman at Corsica-Stickney High School took part in a CPR training course. As part of the training the students participated in a variety of activities. Students viewed a video demonstrating the CPR procedure, as well as stressing the importance of learning CPR in order to help save lives. Students were instructed the "Hands-Only" CPR procedure, which focuses on using chest compressions to save lives. Students got a hands on approach to doing CPR through the use of "Annie Dolls," they were able to demonstrate the skills they learned. The number one reason people are afraid to give CPR to someone is they are afraid they are doing it wrong, any CPR is better than no CPR. Through this training course Corsica-Stickney students now have the knowledge and skills in order to save lives!
