I do want to say summer is also time to have some brief, fun academic time as well. Summer slide is something that we know is possible but hopefully can be avoided by simply spending 30 minutes a day reading! Summer is a great time to use technology to play some academic games that help students keep their math and reading skills sharp.

What is "Summer Slide" you may wonder? Here are some scary statistics regarding Summer Slide. **Children who don't** read over the summer will lose up to three months of reading achievement. Reading loss is cumulative: Students who don't read during the summer could be three years below grade level by 5<sup>th</sup> grade simply from not reading during the summer. This cumulative loss makes it very difficult to close the achievement gap that exists during the school year alone. Summer reading loss has been identified as one of the three major obstacles to get students to reading proficiency. The other two obstacles are students who are chronically absent in the early grades and students who enter kindergarten unprepared. The GOOD NEWS is that it can be prevented easily by encouraging your child to read or reading to them as little as 30 minutes per day. Establish a routine and a time each day to set aside for reading and math activities.

Mrs. Fuerst's FACS Child


Development Class went
