

Biking Safely on Sidewalks and Shared Use Paths

Don't forget your bicycle helmet.

Wear it flat on your head and buckled!

- √ Ride in a straight line, single file.
- √ Obey all traffic signs and signals.
- Ride with both hands on the handlebars except when signaling a turn or stop.
- √ Stop and look left-right-left for traffic before entering a street.
- √ Walk your bike across an intersection.
- √ Stay alert use your eyes to look for things that could make you fall, like potholes, cracks pebbles, or wet leaves.
- √ Stay alert use your ears to listen for traffic. Don't wear earphones while riding.
- Watch for parked cars and cars pulling out or into parking spaces or driveways.
- √ Check your equipment. Make sure your bike tires are properly inflated and that the brakes work.

student of the Month



Elementary Principal Kemp has implemented a "Student of the Month" program where all the students will be observed over the month by the entire staff. They will be judged on how well they exemplify the Jaguar Way code. (see next page for code) Winners will have their picture displayed for the next month and receive a special treat from Mrs. Kemp. Those nominated but not winning also received a smaller treat.

















The Jaguar Code:

(This is an adapted form of the Cowboy Code)

- 1) <u>Live each day with courage:</u> Courage is also known as daring, bold, true grit, heroism. To live each day with courage means to be able to face things that frighten you or scare you, or give you pain. It also means standing up for what is right even though there are people who may disagree with you.
- 2) <u>Take Pride in your work</u>: We should always be looking for ways to improve on what we are doing. Trust in yourself, and be proud of what you do. When you take satisfaction in what you are doing. Once you start to take pride in your work, the classroom environment around you will start to change. You will feel happier at school, and you will add to the positives in your class. So here are some things we look for to know when kids are taking pride in their work:
 - a. Your name is on it: When your name is on it, we know that you want to be recognized for the effort you put into your work. Be proud of the work you do!
 - b. **Build a reputation for good work**: The more good work you do, the sooner you will start being recognized for your achievements.
 - c. **Know what you don't know**: in order to take pride in your work, you need to know what you did not know. Then you seek to improve. When you begin to constantly try to improve, that is when you are showing pride in your work!
 - d. <u>Build trust</u>: you have to do the kind of work people around you can trust in, and you have to trust yourself that you can do good work. Trust that even though you may not know all of the answers, that you do have good thoughts and input when it comes to your work.
- 3) Always finish what you start: Not finishing your work, or something you have started can be very hard on a person's mindset, and when more and more things continually pile up that are unfinished, it makes it even harder to get them all done. When you are given something to do GET IT DONE! When you are given assignments get in the frame of mind don't tell yourself "I have to do this" because that already sets a negative signal in your brain.
- 4) **Do what has to be done**: We are in school, we know the job we are here to do. It doesn't matter what it is, you need to do what has to be done in school at home and eventually and school activities, and eventually AT YOUR JOB!
- 5) Be tough, but fair: There are expectations that we have from all of you, and I am sure that you students have expectations of all of us. Make sure everyone is clear on the expectations whether this is with your teammates, friends etc. I am sure that if you are all out for basketball or band, you expect everyone on the team or in the group to show up for practice, right? If you are playing a game, you expect people to follow the rules- those are things we set as expectations, and we need to hold ourselves as well as others to them. When someone isn't meeting the expectations, we have to be polite when correcting the mistakes, and make sure that things remain fair.
- 6) When you make a promise, KEEP IT!: Promise: assure someone that one will definitely do, give, or arrange something; undertake or declare that something will happen. This is what you are doing when you make a promise to someone. When you say "I promise..." and don't keep it, what you are actually doing is telling that person that you don't value him or her. It show them that you have purposely chosen to put something ahead of the commitment you made. When we break even a small promise, others quickly learn that they cannot count on you, which hurts your relationships you have with your family, friends, or teachers. It also tells yourself that you don't value your own word. It is like disrespecting yourself.
- 7) Play for the team: Our Jaguar Team is our Corsica-Stickney Trademark. When other people hear about Corsica-Stickney Jaguars, it should represent pride, duty, stewardship (the job of supervising or taking care of something, such as an organization or property, while inspiring loyalty, dedication, and camaraderie. When you play for the team, it means that you are putting your effort toward one mission or goal that you had committed, you are a dedicated team player that will do whatever it takes to have success for your team no matter what kind of "Team" it may be. (Band, Choir, Play, Sports teams, School test scores, 4-h, shooting sports, etc.)
- 8) <u>Talk less and say more</u>: "What you do speaks so loudly that I cannot hear what you say" Ralph Waldo Emerson. "Wise men speak because they have something to say; Fools because they have to say something." Plato -Learn to talk less and say more- this means that when you use your words, use them because they will brighten someone's day and because they will teach something valuable. Don't just use words for the sake of using them. Use them because you have something to say.
- 9) Remember that somethings aren't for sale: On the flip side: Somethings can't be bought. Always remember, the best things in life aren't things. We have to put a value on our reputation and ourselves above all else.
- 10) Know where to draw the line: There is a right and a wrong and nothing in between. Doing the right thing this time and every time. The way you act reflects your character (what kind of person you are), principles and values.
