The American Library Association has found a strong connection between daily independent reading and overall student performance. Here are the top 10 benefits of independent reading on a daily basis. **We encourage YOU to encourage your students to READ!**

- 1. **Reading exercises our brain** Reading is a much more complex task for the brain rather than watching TV. Reading strengthens brain connections and builds NEW connections.
- 2. **Students who read often get better at it** Practice makes perfect in almost everything students do and reading is NO different.
- 3. **Reading teaches students about the world around them** By reading a variety of books, students learn about people, places and events all around the world.
- 4. **Reading IMPROVES concentration** Students have to sit still and quietly so they can focus on the story when reading. If they read often, they will develop the skills to do this longer.
- 5. **Reading develops a student's imagination** When students read their brains translate the descriptions we read of people, places and things into pictures. When students are engaged in a story they are imagining how a character looks and is feeling. Students then bring this knowledge into their daily lives.
- 6. **Reading IMPROVES vocabulary and language skills** Students learn new words as they read. They learn how to structure sentences and how to use words and other language features in their writing and speaking.

- 7. **Reading is FUN** A book doesn't take up much space, so students can take them anywhere and never be bored.
- 8. **Reading helps a child develop EMPATHY** As students develop, they begin to imagine how they would feel in that situation they are reading about.
- 9. **Reading is a GREAT way to spend time TOGETHER** Reading together, bedtime stories and visiting a library are great ways of spending time together.
- 10. Children who read often ACHIEVE better in SCHOOL Reading promotes achievement in all subjects, not just English. Students who are good readers tend to achieve better across the curriculum.

We the Staff of Corsica-Stickney Elementary have made it our GOAL this school year to bring more reading into our student's daily lives. Most of the teachers have taken a professional development class titled "Pathways to Proficient Reading". These classes gave our teachers knowledge in the Science of Reading. This was a research based professional development course that prepared our teachers to explicitly and systemically teach the Five Pillars: Phonemic Awareness, Phonics, Vocabulary, Fluency, and Comprehension. The goal is to have all students become proficient readers and this course gave our teachers the skills to make this goal a reality. We are also taking an opportunity EVERYDAY to READ ALOUD to our students! Modeling fluent reading helps students become better readers themselves.

I encourage you all to encourage your students to take time to read independently every day. Please consider reading aloud to your students at home each day as well. The benefits will come to them ten-fold in the long run!





Leadership & Service

Students have been busy working on small group projects, focusing on improving their communication skills. They're learning that strong communication is the foundation of effective leadership and teamwork.

Employability

The Employability class has been exploring the all-important question: "Why should I hire you?" Students are reflecting on their personal qualities and traits that will benefit them in the workforce, while practicing how to confidently present themselves to potential employers.

2 8th Grade FCS

Our 8th graders are diving into team-building activities and researching the 16 Career Clusters. They are also learning how to navigate and use SDMyLife, a tool that helps them connect career exploration with their own strengths and interests.

Relationships

Students in the Relationship class are wrapping up a unit on Healthy vs. Unhealthy Relationships. They are learning how to recognize red flags and develop the ability to build positive, respectful connections with others.

Nutrition & Wellness I
