Family literacy is defined as home literacy activities that provide literacy skill-building opportunities for young children while enhancing literacy skill development in all members of the family. These activities should be started as early as preschool and continue throughout High School. Modeling reading to children is also important for literacy development at all ages. FACS of Life – November Newsletter

As we move deeper into the semester, our FCS classrooms have been full of learning, hands-on experiences, creativity, and meaningful conversations. Here's a look at what our students have been busy working on across all of our FCS courses!

<u>Leadership & Service</u> – Professional Presentations – Our Leadership students have been sharpening their communication and presentation skills through professional presentations. They have been learning what it means to show confidence, clarity, and organization while speaking skills that will serve them not only in school, but in future careers, interviews, and community leadership roles. Students practiced giving and receiving feedback, designing slides, and learning how to present themselves with poise and purpose.

8th Grade FCS – Kitchen Skills & Eight Dimensions of Wellness - Our 8th graders have been busy in the FCS kitchen! Students practiced basic food preparation, teamwork, kitchen safety, and following recipes. In addition, students were introduced to the 8 Dimensions of Wellness, learning that wellness includes so much more than physical health. Through discussions and small activities, they explored how emotional, social, environmental, financial, spiritual, mental, and intellectual wellness all connect to creating a balanced and healthy life.

<u>Employability – Preparing for Mock Interviews - Our Employability class is moving full steam ahead as students prepare for their upcoming mock interviews.</u> They have been polishing and finalizing professional resumes, continuing development of their Career Portfolios, learning how to communicate strengths confidently, meeting with guest speakers who shared real-world career insights. Students are becoming more confident in their abilities and are excited to put everything together for their mock interviews.

<u>Relationships – Midlife & the Empty Nest - In Relationships</u>, students are wrapping up their unit on Midlife and Empty Nest Syndrome. They explored how families change over time, how parents and partners navigate transitions, and the emotional, financial, and relational challenges that may arise in midlife. Through scenarios and class discussions, students gained a deeper understanding of empathy, communication, and healthy coping strategies during this stage of life.

Nutrition & Wellness I – Fad Diets, Eating Disorders & The Eight Wellnesses - Nutrition & Wellness students have completed important units on fad diets, eating disorders, and media influences on body image. We have now shifted into a deeper study of the 8 Wellnesses of Life and how balance in each area impacts overall health. Students are in the process of creating a personal wellness booklet, which will include, self-care strategies, activities to support each dimension of wellness, personalized reminders for maintaining balance, healthy habits they can continue into adulthood. This booklet will serve as a meaningful reflection tool and a resource for their future.

<u>American Education Week – November 17–21 - This year's American Education Week theme was "Gratitude."</u> Throughout the week, students focused on what it means to appreciate the people who support them every day. Activities included, sharing treats with staff and students, writing thoughtful, heartfelt thank you cards, expressing gratitude to classmates, recognizing that our school community thrives because *everyone* contributes to creating a safe, positive, and supportive learning environment

It was a wonderful opportunity to step back, reflect, and show appreciation for those who make Corsica-Stickney a great place to learn.








Football


