PLAY IT COOL IN COLD WEATHER

Driving on icy or snow-covered roads requires far more sensitive car handling than the average motorist exercises on dry surfaces.

PLAY IT COOL: Follow these helpful hints.

*Use a lighter touch on the brake, accelerator, and steering wheel

*Accelerate slowly and gradually to avoid spinning the wheels

*Try to avoid situations in which quick stops may be necessary

*Pump brakes gently to maintain steering control and to prevent the car from going into a skid when you stop

*Negotiate corners gingerly to avoid a skid-starting jerk of the steering wheel

*If you should go into a skid, turn the steering wheel gently in the direction of the skid. Then, after directional control is established, reduce your speed by braking gently, and returning to your planned route

*Keep your seat belt fastened at all times

CORSICA OVER BONESTEEL FOR 9th WIN

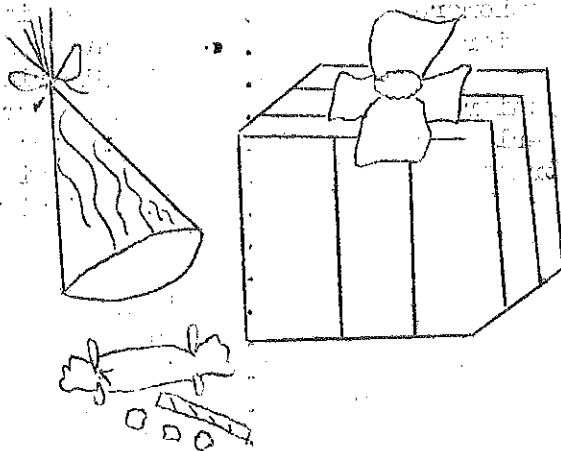
Corsica bumped Bonesteel 74-52 on January 7. The Comets controlled the game from the outset as Bonesteel just couldn't match the Comet's power.

The seniors say "Thank you" to the Priscilla Club and all who helped to make the day a meaningful day for the class.

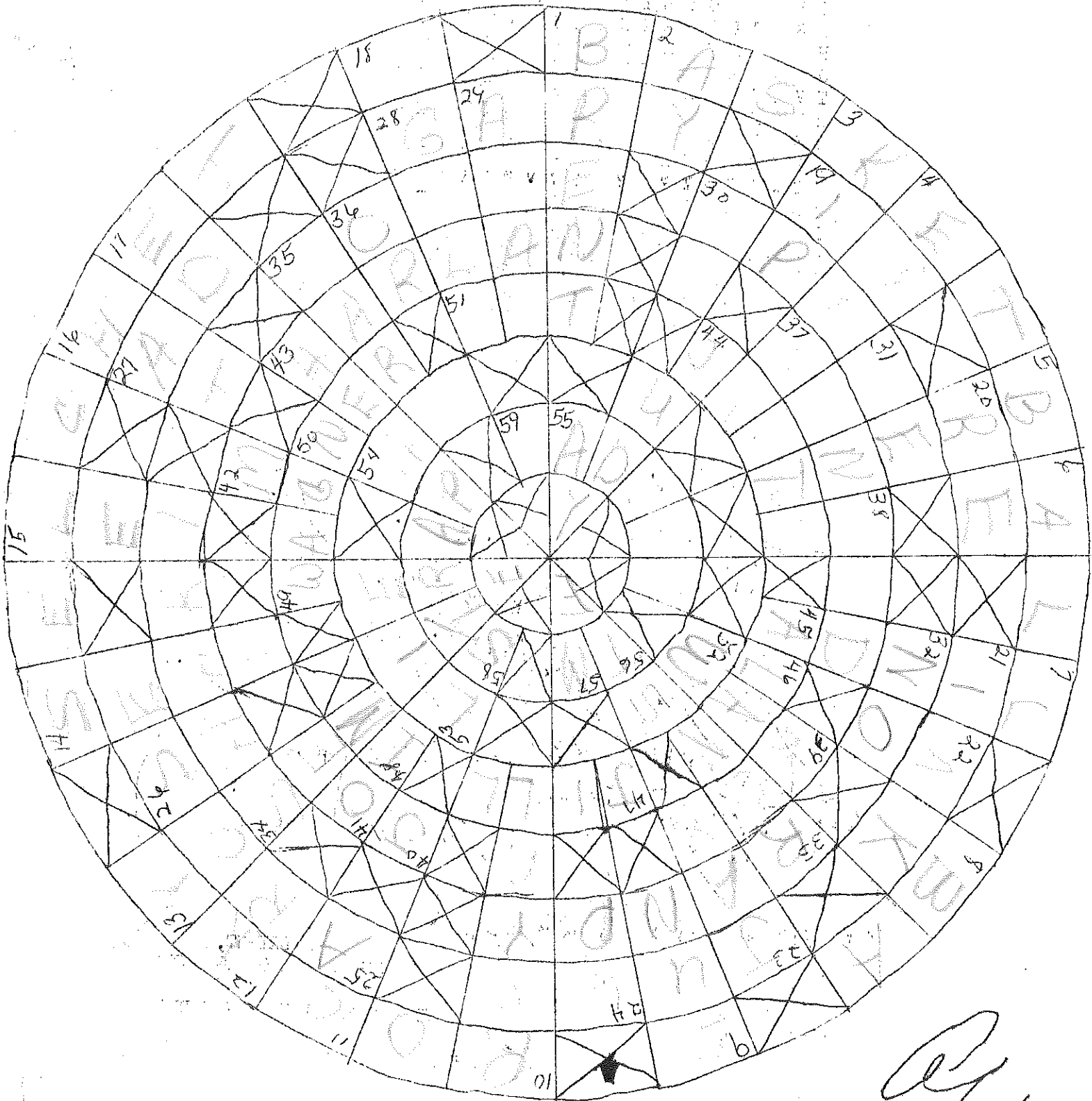
