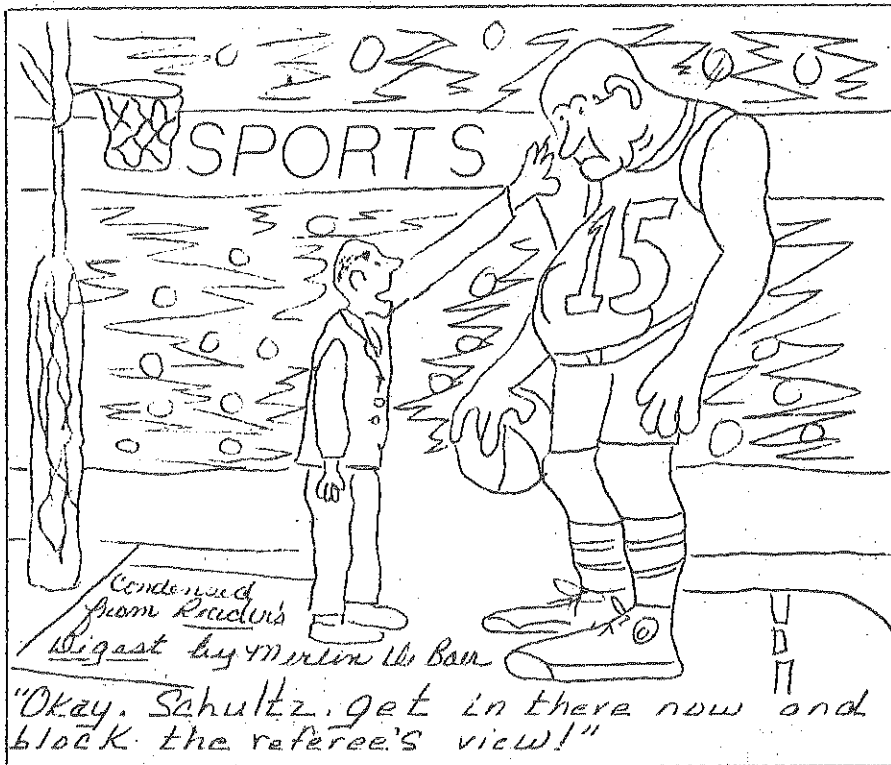

The Corsica Comets overwhelmed the Plankinton Pirates by a score of 65-51 last Tuesday, January 20 at Plankinton.

The Comets, shooting a hot 45.5 per cent in the first half took a quick lead in the first quarter which held for the remainder of the game. Scoring for the Comets were Mark Van Zee with 15 points and Joe Maunders and Roy Beukelman both with 14 points. Roy had the best percentage as he shot a respectable 62.5 per cent.

The Corsica Comets fell to the Ethan Rustlers 76-70 last Tuesday night as the Rustlers pumped in 10 points in overtime play.

The Comets couldn't find the basket as they threw 20 stray shots for a 28.5 per cent average in the fourth quarter. The Comets proved too hot for the Rustlers in the beginning of the fourth quarter as we fought off a five point deficit to pull ahead 10 points. The tide turned just when things looked good for their steady scoring poll to pull even at the buzzer. The overtime period couldn't find the Comets scoring as they bowed to the hot shooting Rustlers.

Brent Beukelman proved to be the sharp shooter for the Comets as he connected on 60 per cent of his shots scoring 19 points. Also scoring 19 points was Joe Maunders. Brent De Boer followed with 12 points.

The Rustlers put four men in double figures with Friedel leading with 25 points followed by Thuringer, Schlaffman, and J. Ocker with 18, 13, 11 points respectively. The Rustlers sported a steady scoring pace as they shot a 45.2% in the field. They didn't leave the free throw alone as Friedel scored 15 -18 free throws out of his total 25 points.

The B Team Comets came from behind in the fourth quarter to beat the B Team Rustlers 47-38.

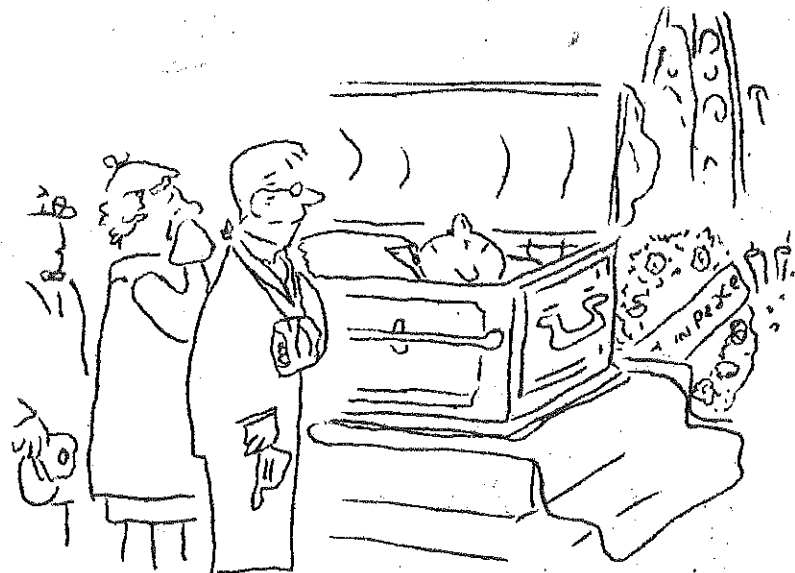

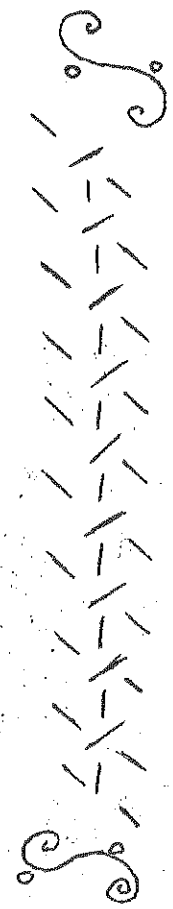
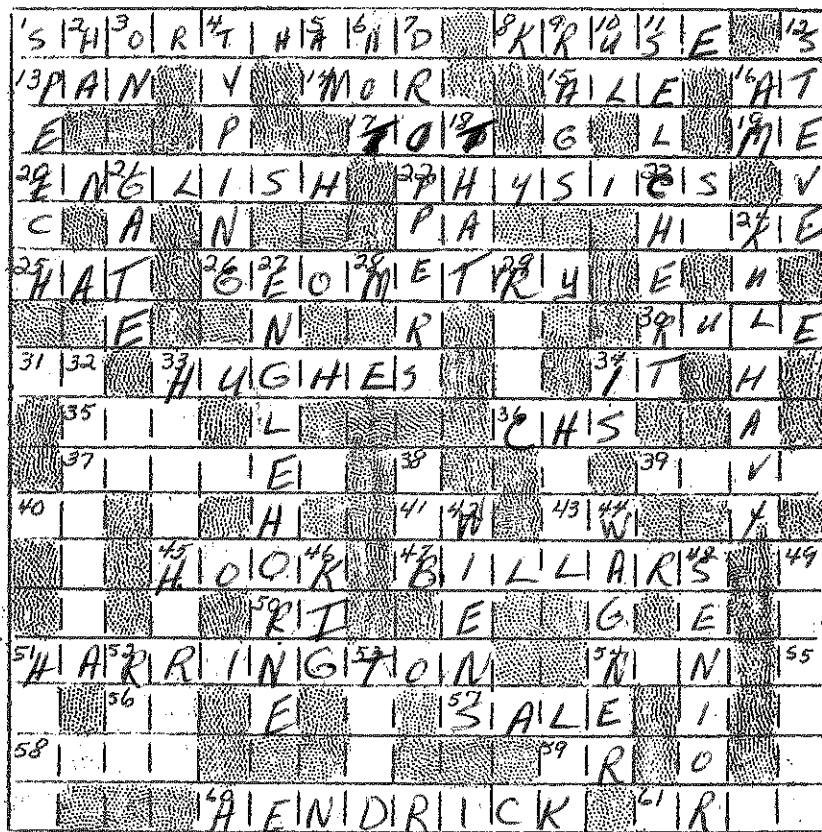
