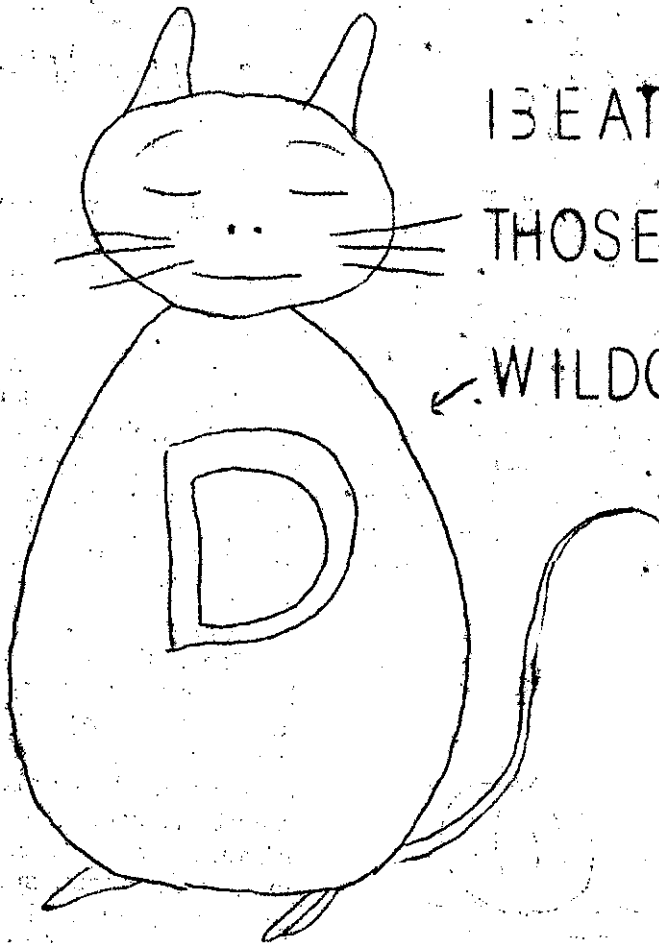
I thought this seminar was very interesting, educational, and worthwhile, and I thank the Corsica Bank who paid all the expenses.
