The school newspaper has a responsibility to record and inform the students about the happenings in their school. This newspaper is a concise history book and a fiture; book for the school. It keeps the students aware of the Happenings in the system.

The last function of a paper is to air 🕾 the opinions of the students. The newspaper offers an ily accessible formal procedure to make the students feelings. known. Only too often the students are not allowed to voice them selves in any formal war soncerning keheir education. This should be a necessary element in developing a policy for a system Most responsible students have the most to gain or lose from the way a school is operated. Therefore, their concern should be realgaized through the use of a newspaper sopinion column.

In consideration of the needs of students, school, and community the school newspaper must play an important part in the school system.
