VOTERS TO DECIDE ISSUE

Voters in the Corsica School District will soon decide on a second School Bond Issue for construction of a new high school building.

At this time the Board of Education is proposing a school building at a cost of \$1,000,000.

In cooperation with the school board, Architects Plus is sending out an opinion questionnaire to the eligible voters in the district. Input from this survey will help the board decide what the community wants in a new school.

A Citizens Input Committee has also been formed by the school board consisting of two representatives from each board member's area.

Teachers have also been questioned on what they feel a new school should include. From this, the board hopes to make the best use of the funds used for the new building.

Over two hundred and thirty thousand will be provided by the Capital Outlay Fund, this amount has been collected from taxes throughout the past four-five years. This fund is set aside specially for repairs and building purposes.

We have been held up more by our printing rather than by our lack of work. I ask you to appreciate our circumstances.

A Corsica High School newspaper should serve three basic functions - to inform the community about the school, to record past, present, and future events, and to

serve as an outlet for student opinion.

So often one of the most important institutions in a small community, -- is the institution that the people know the least about. Patrons are not informed about the day-to-day needs, services, and activities of a school. The blame for this does not fall on any one individual or group of individuals, the responsibility should be assumed by the school newspaper. The newspaper staff is usually aware of the happenings in the school, because they are involved with it. Because of this awareness, the school newspaper can serve the community need for information.

The school newspaper has a responsibility to record and inform the students

about the happenings in their school. This newspaper is a concise history book and a future book for the school. It keeps the students aware of the happenings in the system.

The last function of a paper is to air the opinions of the students. The newspaper offers an easily accessible formal procedure to make the students feelings known. Only too often the students are not allowed to voice themselves in any formal way concerning their education. This should be a necessary element in developing a policy for a system. Most responsible students have the most to gain or lose from the way a school is operated. Therefore, their concern should be realized through the use of a newspaper's opinion column.

In consideration of the needs of students, school, and community the school newspaper must play an important part in the school system.

Forrest Stredde- "No, everyone resorts to cheating to make the grades."

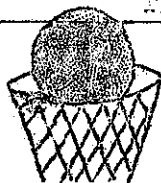
Mr. Wieseler- "Yes, I think it has, It emphasizes the importance to grades."

Basketball

The girls' basketball team now has a 15 record having played Delmont, Kimball, Mt. Vernon, Geddes, Stickney, Artesian, Kimball, and Letcher.

Delmont beat the Comets 58-38 on September 6. Barb Peters led Corsica with 13 counters and 16 rebounds while Delmont won the backboard duel 46-33. Corsica took the junior varsity game 33-9.

Kimball nabbed a CBH Conference win 46-35 over Corsica on Sept. 20. Leading Corsica's offense was Dianne Menning and Londa Groeneweg with 13 points each and Paulette Vanden Hoek's 12 rebounds. Corsica hit 25 per cent of their shots and fell 29-13 in the junior varsity tilt.

On Sept. 27 the girls traveled to Mt. Vernon and beat the Mustangs 52-25. Leading scorer was Londa Groeneweg with 22 points, closely followed by Barb Peters with 18 points and 11 rebounds.

The Comets hit 21 shots out of 51 for 41 per cent and won the junior varsity game 25-13.

Geddes tripped Corsica 31-28 on October 3. Dianne Menning contributed 15 points along with Barb Peters grabbing 14 rebounds. Geddes held edges in rebounds (39-36), shooting (25-19 per cent). They also won the junior varsity game 28-13.

Stickney beat the Comets 48-33 on Oct. 4. Barb Peters notched 12 points and 9 rebounds while Dianne Menning finished with 11 points. Stickney also won the junior varsity game 30-22.

Corsica used double figure scoring of four players to subdue Artesian 56-48 Oct. 10. Leading in scoring was Londa Groeneweg with 16 points, followed by Barb Peters with 12 points and 11 rebounds, and Dianne Menning and Deb King with 11 points each. Corsica pulled down 33 rebounds and shot 21-62 for 33 per cent. Corsica also

won the junior varsity game 29-26.

Ethan nabbed a CBH Conference win 42-29 over Corsica on Oct. 18. Leading scorer was Londa Groeneweg with 10 points, closely followed by Barb Peters with 8 points and 10 rebounds. Geraldyn Oster hit 20 points and grabbed 21 rebounds for Ethan along with Pam Oberembt grabbing 20 rebounds. Corsica shot 13 of 54 for 24 per cent while Ethan shot 18 of 63 for 28 per cent. Corsica grabbed 29 rebounds to Ethan's 55 rebounds. Ethan won the junior varsity game 18-11.

Corsica latched on to a CBH Conference win 38-26 from the Letcher Tigers on Oct. 25. Barb Peters led with 14 points and 13 rebounds, closely followed by Londa Groeneweg with 12 points. Corsica grabbed 32 total rebounds and shot 18 of 53 for 34 per cent. Corsica also won the junior varsity game 25-19.

In the opening game of the season, the Comets fell to Woonsocket 46-6. But in the second game, the Comets made a comeback and beat the Kimball Kiotes 36-14.

The Comets then traveled to Mt. Vernon to grab another CBH Conference victory as they stomped the Mustangs 36-6. Next was the game against the rival Stickney and the Comets pulled out on top again to defeat the Raiders 30-22 in tight CBH Conference play.

Hall said lab furniture, desks, and lockers could be used from the present facilities to cut down some costs.

Architects Plus figures the building could be ready for occupancy 12-14 months after the passage of bond issue.

Chances for the bond issue, according to

Mr. Hall, are "fair." Mr. Hall said "I think peoples' attitude toward the Bond Issue depends on what people sincerely feel are the basic needs for our purposes."
