# CITIZENSHIP SEMINAR

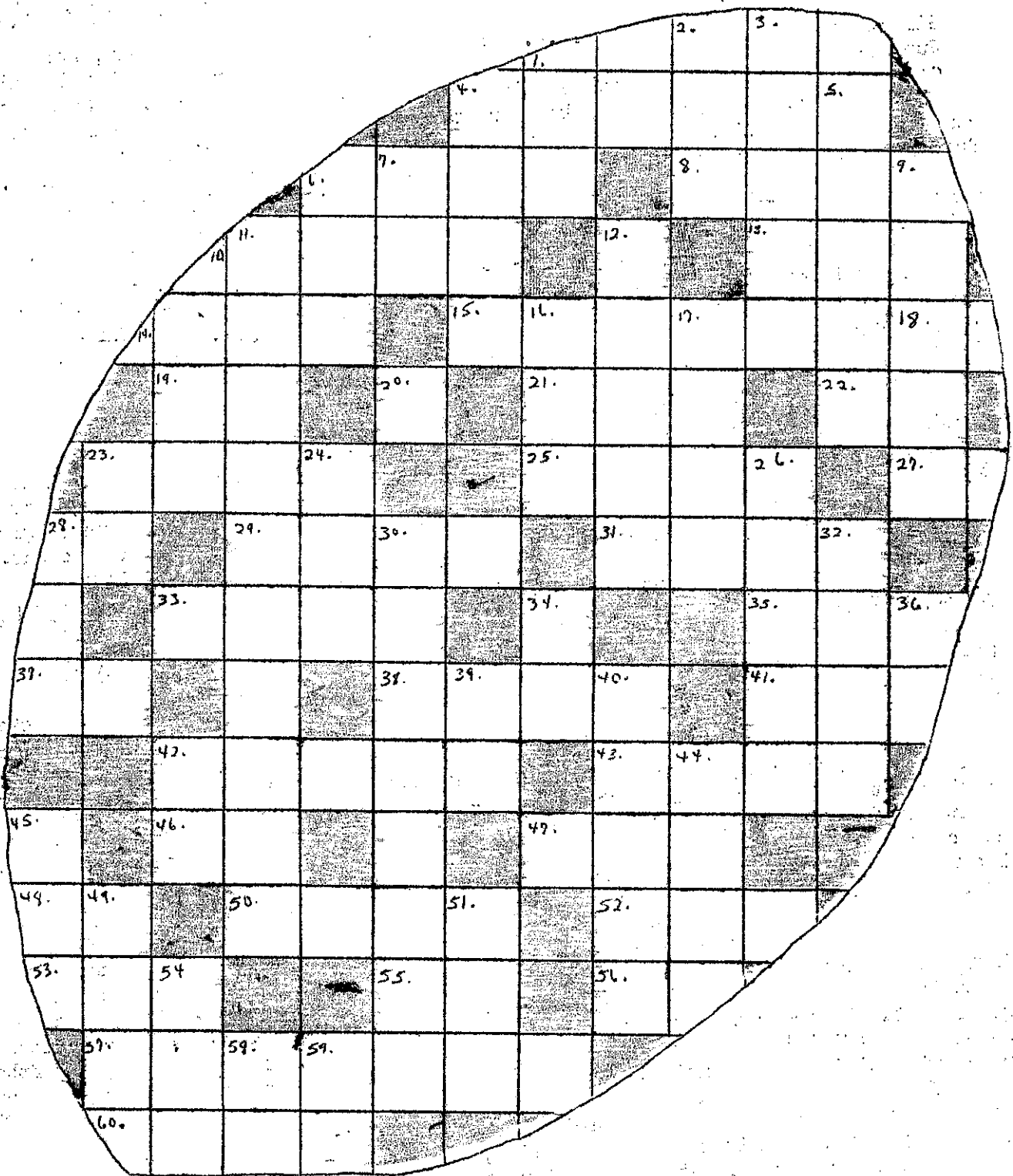

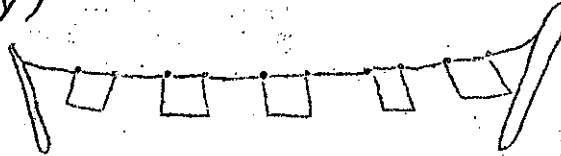

Congratulations to Kay and Peggy, cheerleaders from the freshman class.

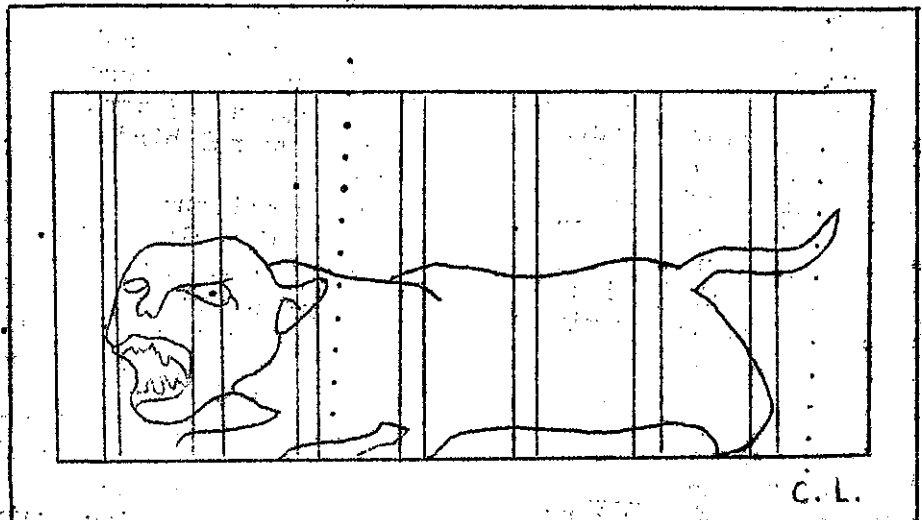
