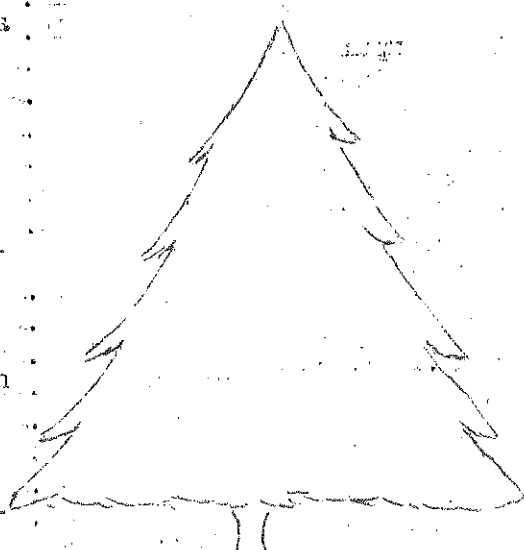
SENIORS TAKE ACT TESTS

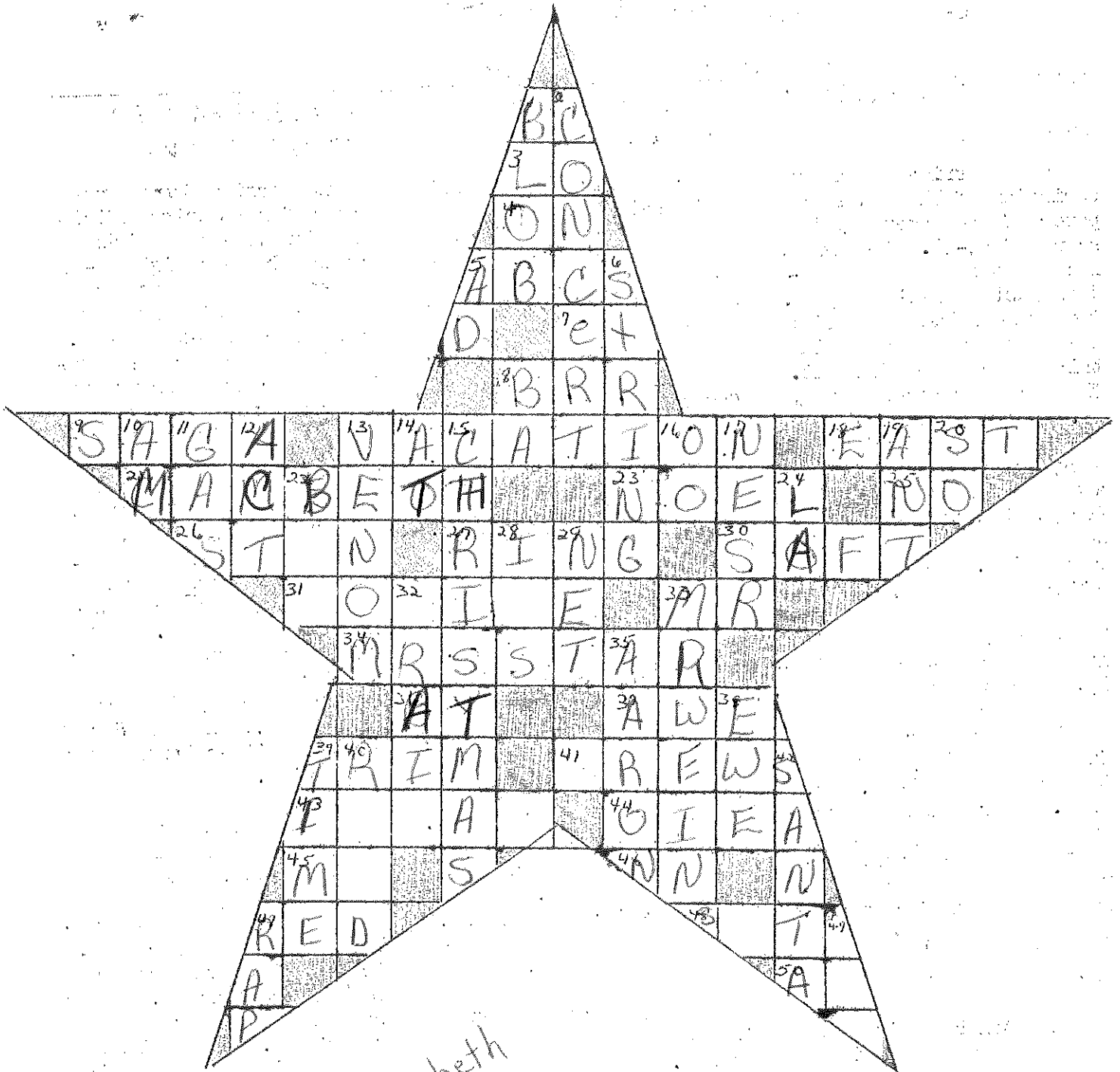
In the midst of all the noise, rush, and strife of the world, we can still hear the message of the angel-- "for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy.."

For White Lake Wayne Haines was strong rebounding and also threw in nine points.

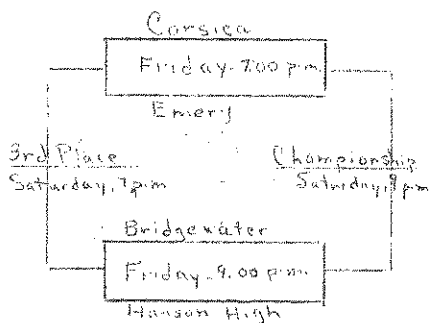
RAIDERS FALL TO COMET TEAMS

Mr. Billars the principal's jobs he'll take. "Yes, he has a few announcements to make."

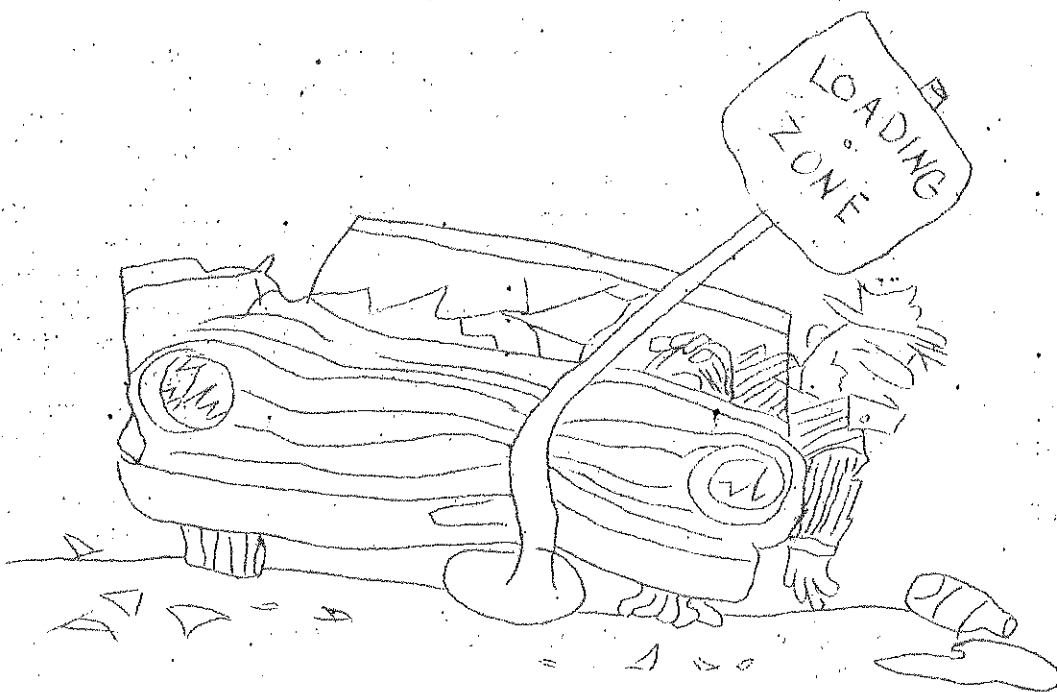
Mr. Englehorn, a man without a wrong, is now letting his hair grow long.
