After the program is concluded everyone is welcome to try their hand at the assortment of booths. To conclude the evening, coronation of the King and Queen will take place at 10:30 p.m.


KAREN VREUGDENHIL TO REPRESENT CHS AT MISS HOLIDAY BALL

NEW FOOTBALL FIELD BEING BUILT

The new football field and track have been planned out and started on an area at the east end of main street, according to principal, Mr. Anderson. September 13 the school board voted to have the lot leveled and have grass sown on the lot. October 4 John Van't Haaff presented the board with an idea of what the project would involve and an estimate of the costs. October 28 the school board accepted Van't Haaff's bid of \$17,305.20 to do the leveling, etc. and gave him the "go ahead" on the project.

It was hoped to have the lot leveled out, have the football field crowned, and have the track laid out this fall. It looks like it might have to wait until the spring of '77 since the ground is already frozen.

After this is done, the grass is to be seeded on the entire area of the football field and track. If rain helps the grass to get a good start, the football field might be ready for play next year. Otherwise, the '78 team will probably be the first team that uses it. Plans are also being made for a parking lot.

The track for now will just be a regular dirt track. Eventually, in a couple of years, maybe the track will be changed to an all-weather or a more permanent surface track. Both the football field and track will be fenced in this coming spring if everything works out right.

Muck of the total area of 20 acres of land will be left for building a new school in the future. There is a design already made for a school building by Simpson Construction. Before the new school can be started, the farmers need good crops in order to pay for a new school.

YEARBOOK STAFF CHANGES ADS, MAKES PLANS FOR GROUP PICTURES

The yearbook staff is busy taking pictures, planning pages, writing articles, and designing the cover. An ad board will be placed in the gym this year for the year-book advertisers. It will be made up of squars and the advertisers may buy as many squares on the board as they like. The yearbook advertisers' names will be placed on the ad board for one full year, and their names will also be listed in the back of the '77 yearbook. In this way the ads will be more noticeable and the advertising will be more effective.

Yearbook pictures will be taken on Dec. 14. The pictures to be taken are the band, vocal music, boys basketball, cheerleaders, clubs, wrestling, and Student Council.

A complete schedule of the picture taking will be available Monday, Dec. 13. One third of the yearbook is to be completed by February. The yearbooks will be going on sale soon after Christmas.

The ineligibility rule will again be on the agenda at the next regular school board meeting, December 3. The board has discussed the rules and related problems with the faculty, parents, and students at a special meeting December 6. Mr. Anderson met with students in homerooms Wednesday of this week to request their recommendations to the board. The board will consider all comments and make a final decision at the Monday meeting.

COMETS START SUCCESSFULLY

The mighty Comets, under the second year of coaching by Mr. Reinesch, stand at one and one after their first week of play. The Comets opened their season November 30 against the non-conference rival, Tripp Wildcats. The Comets had two particular reasons they wanted to win this game, one was to get revenge on Tripp for defeating us last year in our opening game and the second reason was to start a hopefully great 76-77 season the right way.

The Comets controlled the entire game with some great shooting. Les Groeneweg and Scott Muckey led the Comets in scoring with 15 and 13 points respectively. Defensive standouts for the Comets were Darwin Brouwer and Ivan Brouwer with 7 and 11 rebounds, respectively.

The over-all team field goal percentage was 27-47 for a good 58%. The team lagged a little on free throws with only a 14% average. Leading the Wildcats were Henry Prein and Mike Larvin with 16 points apiece. The final score was 57-47.

The Comets lost their first home game, a conference game, Friday night 64-63 to the White Lake Indians. The game was nip and tuck all the way as the Comets would lead by one and then fall behind by one. This happened many times during the game until that final buzzer rang.

Offensive leaders for the Comets were Les Groeneweg and Darwin Brouwer with 16 points each. Defensively again was Darwin and Ivan Brouwer with 10 and 12 rebounds respectively.

Offensive leaders for the Indians were Ron Kristenson with 11 rebounds and Myron Steffen with 10. The Comets shot a low 38% from the field while White Lake shot 50%.
