


# Only A Good Driver Can Set A Good Example


### Drama Trio Visits CHS

# New Year's Day And Its Many Customs Around The World

1973 is almost here, and with it, we'd like to bring to you a history of New Year's Day.

New Year's Day is the first day of the calendar year. It is celebrated as a holiday in almost every country. New Year's is a time of gaity in the Orient. In Europe, the day is celebrated by family parties, the giving of gifts, and visiting with friends.

In the United States, people attend church, go to the theater, or to various places of entertainment. Friends come to call and refreshments are often served. This custom is an informal way of continuing the formal calls which persons once made.

Even the earliest of the ancient nations had customs that celebrated New Year's Day. The Chinese, Egyptian, Jewish, Roman, and Mohammedan years all began at different times. But the first day of each year was marked with elaborate ceremonies. Thousands of years ago, the Egyptians celebrated the New year about the middle of June.

In ancient Rome, the first day of the year was given over to honoring Janus, the god of gates and doors and of beginnings and endings. The month of January was named after this god. Janus had two faces, and looked both ahead and backward. On the first day of the year the Roman people looked back to what had happened during the past year and thought of what the com-

ing year might bring.

. When the Romans invaded England, they found that the Druid priests celebrated their New Year on March 10. The early English took over many of the Roman New Year customs. Later English people followed the custom of cleaning the chimneys on New Year's Day. This was supposed to bring good luck to the household during the coming year. It means making resolutions to correct faults and bad habits, and resolving to make the new year better than the one just ended.

January 1 became generally recognized as New Year's Day in the 1500's when the Gregorian Calendar was introduced. The Julian Calender places the first day of the year thirteen days later, on January 14. Jewish New Year, a feast day, is celebrated about the autumnal equinox, in late The Chinese September. used the lunar calendar for about 4,000 years. Both the Chinese and Japanese people now celebrate New Year's Day on January 1.

The new year begins on March 21 in Iran. The date of the Hindus' New Year depends upon his religion. The Hindus belong to many different religious groups and each group considers a different water as the beginning of the year.

Now that you know the background of this worldwide celebrated holiday, make sure your own New Year's Day is a happy one!

Had she harmed his family-or maybe him? Was he drinking and driving on some sort of whim? Did he have a mother...kids and a home? Doesn'the know how it feels all alone? If your answer is "yes" to any of these questions—prepare yourself now to answer the questions of some little boy—some father or mother. Chances are, you'll have to!

#### Important Safety Facts

by Darrell Vanden Hoek Here are some facts taken from a Safety Section Fact Sheet from South Dakota Highway Patrol.

Safety is something that all people should be interested in. There are many forms of safety but the one we are the most interested in is automovile safety. There were 55,000 people killed in the United States last year. Some of these fatalities may have been your friends or someone very close to you. Everyone knows that all traffic fatalities can't be stopped, but we can do our best to lessen them. We as citizens can set up safety clubs or some other kind of safety organizations to help teach people the rules of safety on the highway.

Traffic accidents are caused by many different things. Some of the more apparent reasons are drinking, speeding, and wreckless driving. Drinking is the major factor in contributing deaths on your nation's highways. The use of alcohol by drivers and pedestrians leads to some 25,000 deaths and a total of at least 800,000 crashed in the United States each year. Investigations also revealed that between the hours of la.m. and 3 a.m. on any Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the odds for meeting a driver who has been drinking are greater than 1 in 4. A recent study also revealed that there are 3,000,000 alcoholics in the United States holding jobs; and 87% of them drive automobiles. Do you, as a driver and citizen, feel safe to drive on your country's highways knowing these statistics?

Although there has been millions of dollars spent each year on highways, safety features on our highways, and different projects to promote safety; and yet there are still too many deaths on our nations highways. It's you and I and your friends that have to go out and do our share to help promote traffic safety. Are you, as a citizen, doing your share to help promote traffic safety and save lives, a life which may be your own?

# It <u>Can</u> Happen To Y<u>ou</u>!

Most people consider driving a car an essential part of their lives. But it is also very complicated and requires a combination of knowledge, judgement, and skill. In normal driving, the motorist must make decisions at the rate of one every twenty seconds. The skillful and safe driver is in complete control of himself and his car at all times. The following are some basic tips to help you keep control.

\*Control in bad-weather driving means being able to see, steer, and stop safely. Never drive above the speed at which you can maintain complete control. Be sure your car is visible at all times. Periodically check lights, turn signals, and flashers to make sure they're working properly. \*Driving after dark calls for increased alertness and decreased speed. Travel about 10 miles an hours lower er than in clear daylight, never overdriving headlights.

\*Intersections also create a hazard. One out of three accidents occur at an intersection. To avoid such accidents always watch out for cross-traffic and cars making sudden turns.

\*Stops can also cause problems if not executed properly. If your brakes grab or pull to the side or if the pedal nearly hits the floor, they should be checked immediately. Also check your tires for excessive wear. If your tread is less than 2/32" deep, they should be changed.

\*A wandering mind can lead you astray and into a crash.

Fatigue and drowsiness are major causes of lack of attention. Don't drive if you're overly tired, or if you're taking a kind of medicine or pill that warn against drowsiness.

\*Drinking is a factor in at least half of the fatal traffic accidents in the U.S. each year. Medical studies show that even one drink can affect one's ability to drive safely.

Following these tips, along with a few other safe driving practices could be a matter of life and death. No one believes it can happen to him until it's too late, so don't take unnecessary chances while driving.

#### Rules For Pedestrians

 Cross city streets only at corners.

- 2. Where there's a signal wait until the light turns green and be sure all traffic has cleared before you step off the curb.
- 3. If there's no signal wait for a break in traffic.
- 4. Don't step into the street from between parked cars.
- 5. Don't count on motorists stopping or seeing you in time.
- 6. If you walk at night carry something reflective or wear light-colored clothing.

If you're on foot: Don't assume drivers will give you a "brake"!

When you're at the wheel: Remember, a human body is no match for a two-ton carso, whether the pedestrian is right or wrong, he's at your mercy. Show it to him!

# Improvements Made Inside Cars For Better Safety

Many more people are coming out of accidents today, better then they would have if they had had the same accident a few years before. The safety features on our new cars are paying off. Two years after Detroit and the government had begun to make cars safer, the death toll dropped from 56,000 to 54,700. During this period of time the number of accidents rose by 6% but deaths that took place inside cars dropped by  $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ .

Here are some of the lifesaving improvements that are placed inside cars either by the industry or by government order.

- 1. "Blanket" windshields. Today's windshields are made out of plastic, sandwiched by glass. This windshield bends instead of shatters.
- 2. Anti-burst latch. Many people would strike their heads when their doors would open in an accident. One out of 3 doors opened in accidents, but since being improved it is only 1 out of every 15.
- 3. Bendable dash panel. Before dash panels and protruding buttons caused severe injury. Now they bend and spread the impact over a wide area.
- 4. "Cushion" steering wheel. The steering wheel now compresses like a telescope instead of crushing the driver's body.
- 5. Lap-shoulder belts. Lap-shoulder belts are a great help in safety. In crashes where 50 to 100 people might have been killed, all but two escaped with mild or no injury, when they were lap-shoulder belts.
- 6. Head restraints. Even though they are not perfect, there are fewer head and upper-spine injuries.
- 7. "Side-bumpers." Side bumpers are really steel straps inside of the doors. They protect a car from cracking in half when it is hit in the side.
- 8. Disc brakes. These new brakes are still being worked on but are a great improvement over other brakes. They prevent cars from going into wild spins.

Other things that are being worked on are: shock-absorbing front ends, anti-skid devices, better lap-shoulder belts, inflatable crash belts, safety blankets, and double-skinned roofs.



#### Tips In Getting Reggy Reggy Arilen Spaans

Is your car ready for winter? If it isn't, what are you waiting for? The following is a few tips in getting it ready. 1) Make sure of your car's starting efficiency. Would you like to be stalled on the highway just because your starter is bad? Why not replace it? 2) Make sure you put antifreeze in the radiator. so it doesn't freeze in the coldest weather. 3) The windshield should not be cracked so that it impairs your eyesight. Also make sure your wiper blades are in good condition so they can keep the show off the sindshield. 5) Are your tires good or are they worn? Do you have chains along for when the snow gets bad? 6) Do the heater and defroster work? An accident would not be necessary if caused by only a frostedup windshield. How much fun would it be riding in a car with no heater when it is about 20 below zero? 7) How are your brakes and lights working? Think of how dangerous it is riding with poor brakes. Why not get them fixed? Who knows. you may even save your life! How much fun would it be if when getting out on the road, your brakes aren't working, the windshield is cracked, the heater is not working, but you never got around to fixing them. You just didn't get time to do it.

So why don't you prepare your car for winter or you may find yourself walking! HABITS

The winter months may be one of the most dangerous months to drive, but to make them safer, a person has to learn to adjust his driving to the conditions that occur.

Before starting out, make sure all the snow is properly brushed from all the windows. You should run the car awhile before starting to defrost the windows, for this frost could impair your vision.

When such conditions as rain, snow, or fog occur, drive with your headlights on. Don't drive with your parking lights on, for this can deceive oncoming cars as to your relative distance.


Under normal conditions it is a rule to allow at least one car length between vehicles for every 10 miles an hour you are traveling. When conditions of ice or rain occur, the highway becomes a bit more slick and this rule should be changed as to the severity of the condition. Also your speed should be reduced.

With the winter months here, it is up to you as a driver, to try and prevent accidents that are unnecessary. Try to follow some of these habits while you are driving and make some of your own habits this winter for safe driving.


