# Abdnor Gives Advice To Seniors

(This is another in a series of 'People You Should Know'. Although Rep. Abdnor spoke before 600 Boys Staters, he left some thoughts for high schoolers, especially seniors who are joining the adult world this year. The following is taken from my Journalism City report.)

Coming as a surprise even to the counselors, Rep. James Abdnor dropped by to visit Boys' State at our evening meal, and gave some after-meal comments to those attending.

After greeting the boys and dignitaries he turned his attention to the role this year's Staters will play in America's government beginning next year. "The minute you turn 18," he opened, "you will become a stockholder in the greatest corporation on earth. It doesn't matter what your wealth, education, or race is, you all have an equal share. It's how you use that share of stock that will determine in which direction this government is going." Rep. Abdnor proved these were not empty words. He reported that his researchers were all under 25, and their research and advice influence his vote more than any other source. This example stressed the importance of youth.

He ended his talk with a statement: "It has been said that Benjamin Franklin gave our constitutional form of government 200 years to live. I don't know if this is true or not, but with the number of boys in attendance here, I believe our system of government which is in effect today will last for many, many more years."
