In the first of the competition plays, "Limbo," Denise will be played by Laurel Beukelman and Gail by Kris Bordewyk. Sheila Reimnitz and Jason Broughton will team up as Suzanne and Hal Gordon. The part of Min belongs to Gloria Everson. Brad Fisher will play the part of Trenton and Rob Ralston the part of Brice. The young criminal Shad will be portrayed by Les Plooster. Holly Rexwinkel is the student director.
