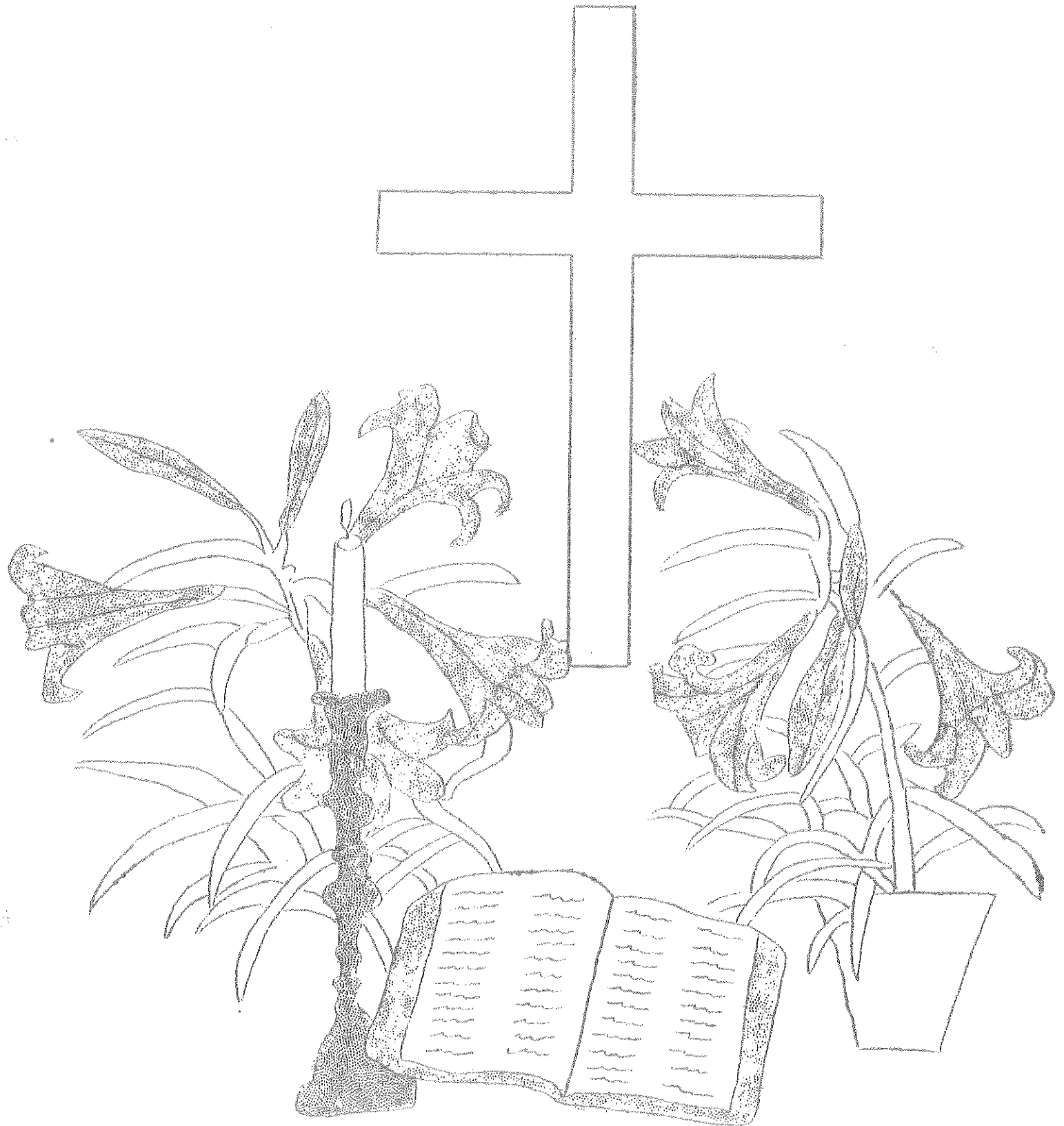

TRACK SEASON OPENS

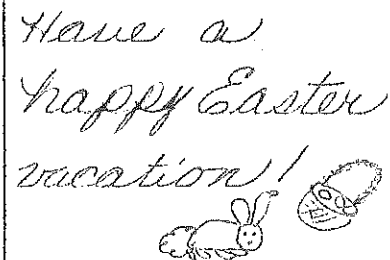
Spring is approaching, and with it the season of track. This season the team will attend a track meet at Brookings as well as other meets.

The Corsica High School gym resounded with singing voices Wednesday afternoon, March 14, when Mr. Peter Chei, an escapee from Red China, presented an inspiring program to CHS students and faculty. The program was climaxed by the participation of the audience in singing the national anthem and saying the flag pledge.

Mr. Chei explained that Chinese music wasn't written in major or minor keys, but was written according to moods. He then demonstrated a happy mood in Chinese music on a flute.

The Swiss sleigh bells were the center of attraction through most of the program. These bells were 100 years old and were originally used on horses. He played several songs, one of which was "God Bless America".

Other points of interest were the tuned bottles, stick bells, and the musical cow bells. He dedicated a song on the cow bells to the junior class, "Mary Had a Little Lamb".

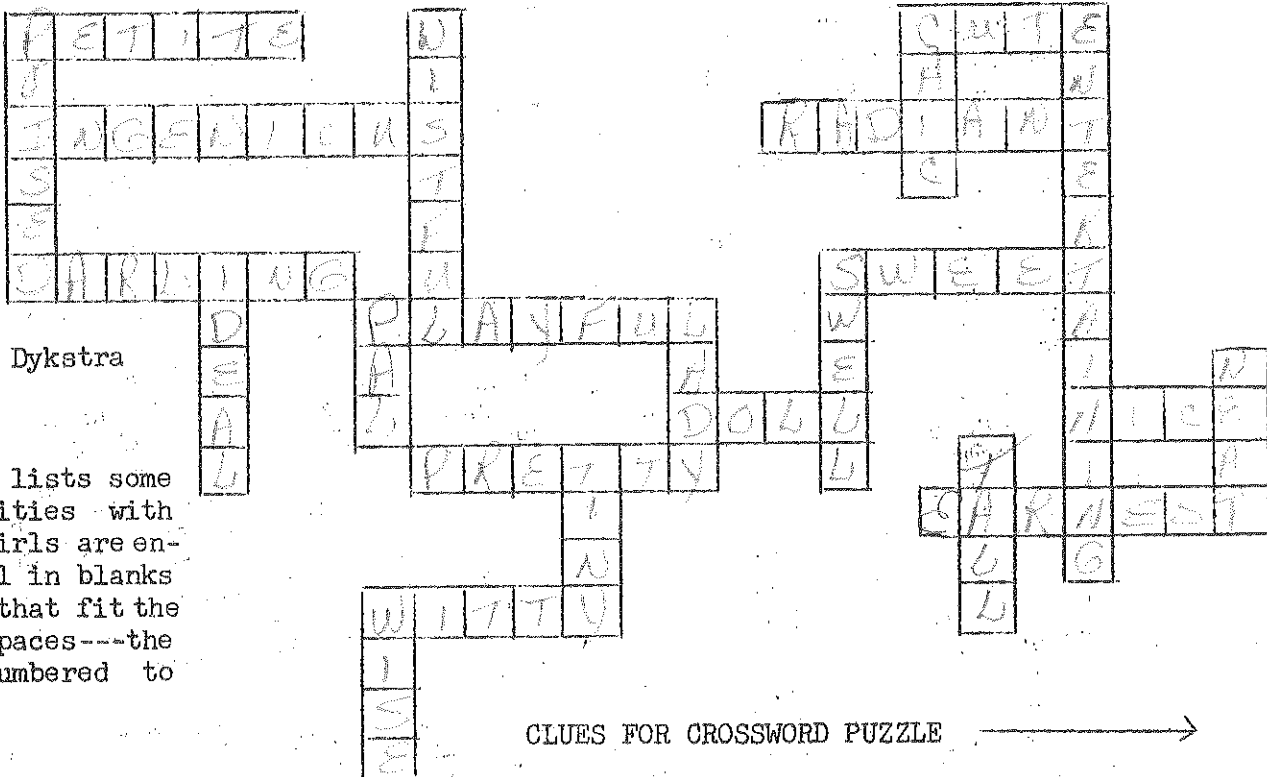
After playing all these different musical bells, he said "Now, I'm tired!" He then asked the little children what they did when they were tired. "Go to sleep," they replied. "Well, I can't go to sleep, but while I rest, I'll play a song on the piano." The gym was silent as everyone listened breathlessly as the beautiful notes of "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" rippled beneath Mr. Chei's musical hands.

Mr. Chei then proceeded to tell the story of his escape from Red China. It was simple but touching and I think it raised many patriotic feelings in the hearts of CHS students.

He warned us to protect and respect our rights correctly. He told us that in Red China today there are only about 10% true Communists and in the U.S. there are 30%.

The program was very inspiring and patriotic and was enjoyed by many.

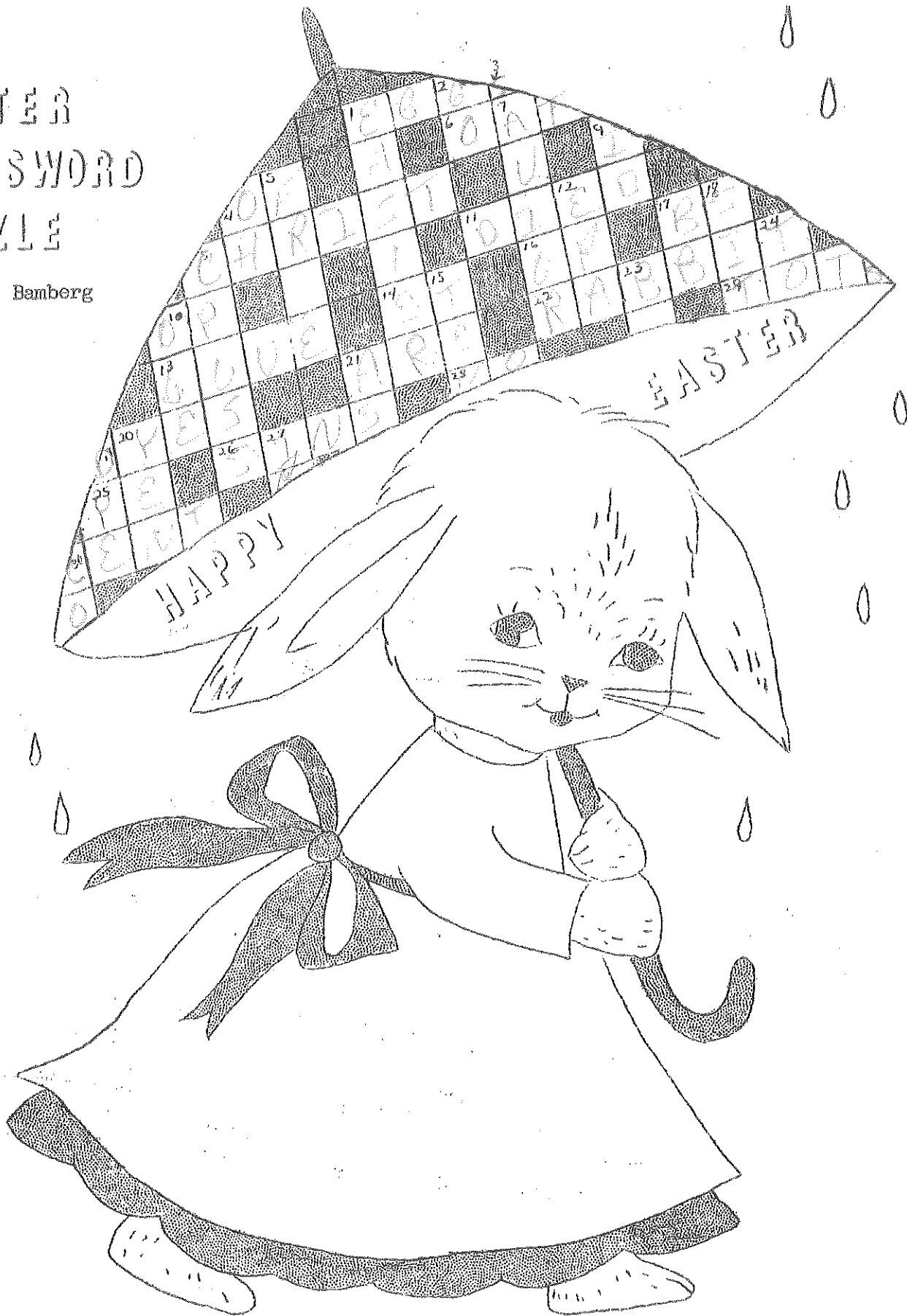

"What will you be doing during Easter Vacation?"

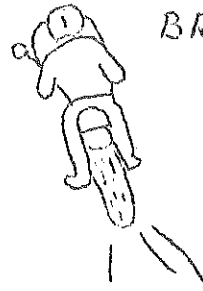


