"PITFALL" PRESENTED

CAST SELECTED FOR SENIOR CLASS PLAY



"Operation Pitfall" was presented in the school auditorium on March 4 at 2:30 P. M. Five inmates from the South Dakota Penitentiary at Sioux Falls very impressively described the "pitfalls" in each of their lives. They told of events leading up to their present sentences in the state prison.

Most larger crimes are triggered by instances such as shoplifting, lying, and consuming alcoholic beverages when in the teen years as was the case in the lives of the five inmates.

Points brought out were the need for teenagers to recognize responsibility, respect authority, use opportunities for self-improvement, get a good education, and use it beneficially.

Of the 507 inmates presently at the penitentiary, 50 have high school diplomas and only three have finished college.

"Operation Pitfall" has been presented to 196 schools and to over 90,000 students and adults in the hopes that the content will make a favorable impact on many people.

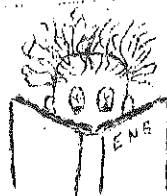
Driver's Ed. Corner

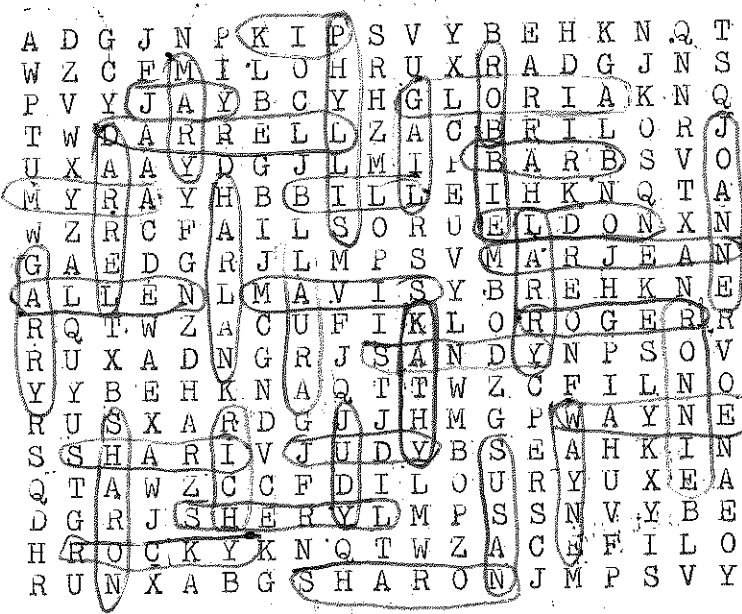

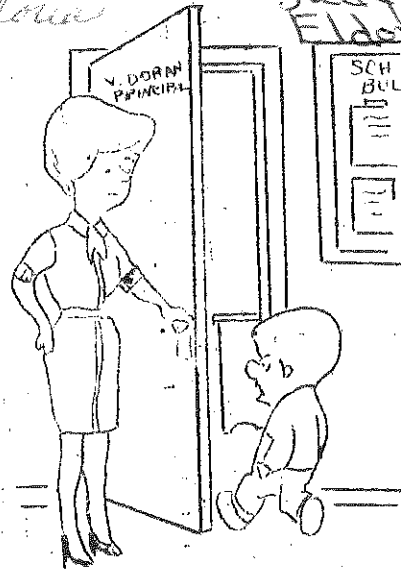
