

# CORSICA HIGH SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

## ASSEMBLY

Mr. Loren Bishop, who was a drug addict for over 20 years, spoke to the student body at 12:30 on Monday, March 10, about drugs and alcohol.

He started his show with an hour lecture to the general assembly. For the first half of this time, Mr. Bishop told us some of the horrible experiences which he faced while in his condition. He had been a drug addict at 18. As he matured, so did his drinking. He had fights in bars with both male and female and many times almost killed people with his bare hands. He finally was in such a terrible state of mind that he started taking 75 to 100 APD's a day to calm his body. He had two wives. The first ran away and left him with two kids who were finally put up for adoption; his second wife was nice but he beat her so severely that she had to get police protection.

The second half of his show he dedicated to telling his audience of the dangers of narcotics, tobacco, and liquor. He ended his lecture with the statement that he hopes he never lived to see the day when LSD and marijuana would be lawful to use.

For the remainder of the afternoon, Mr. Bishop showed four films on lung cancer, LSD, marijuana, and heroin, and alcoholism.

## KULHAVY AWARDED GRANT

Mr. Kulhavy, high school chemistry teacher and grade school supervisor, has accepted a stipend given out by the National Science Foundation for the purpose of upgrading the standard of today's modern teachers. A stipend is a salary which will be given to him for this purpose.

Mr. Kulhavy was one of twenty-four teachers selected for this study from a large number of applicants. He will attend the South Dakota School of Mines at Rapid City for eight weeks beginning June 23 and ending August 15. The course will cover the study of physics where these men attending will supply themselves with greater and more modern information. All expenses will be paid by the stipend.

Mr. Kulhavy intends to use this needed information when he teaches physics next year. He said this grant will help him a great deal in teaching and he hopes to get another stipend next year to help him in chemistry.

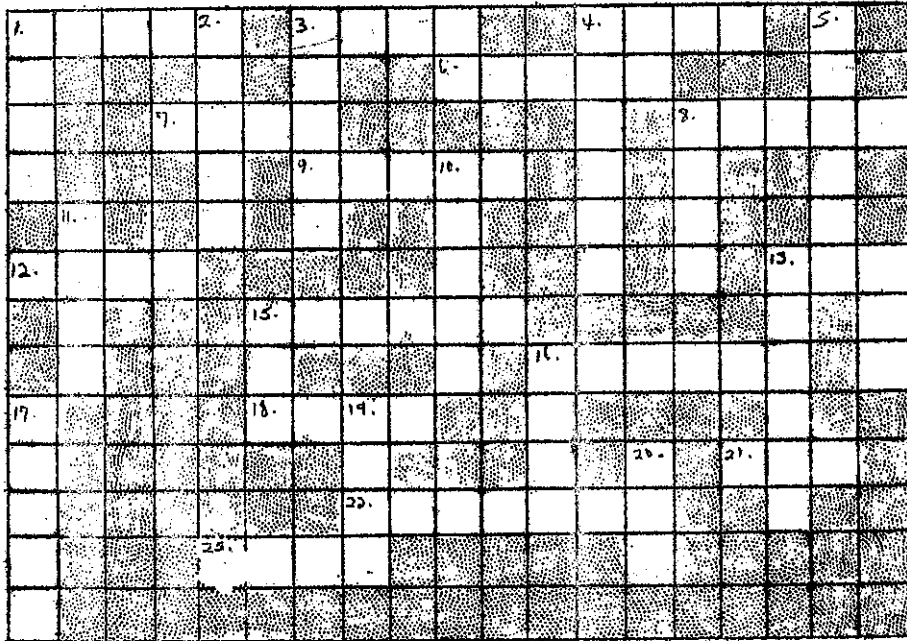

# JUNIOR CROSSWORD



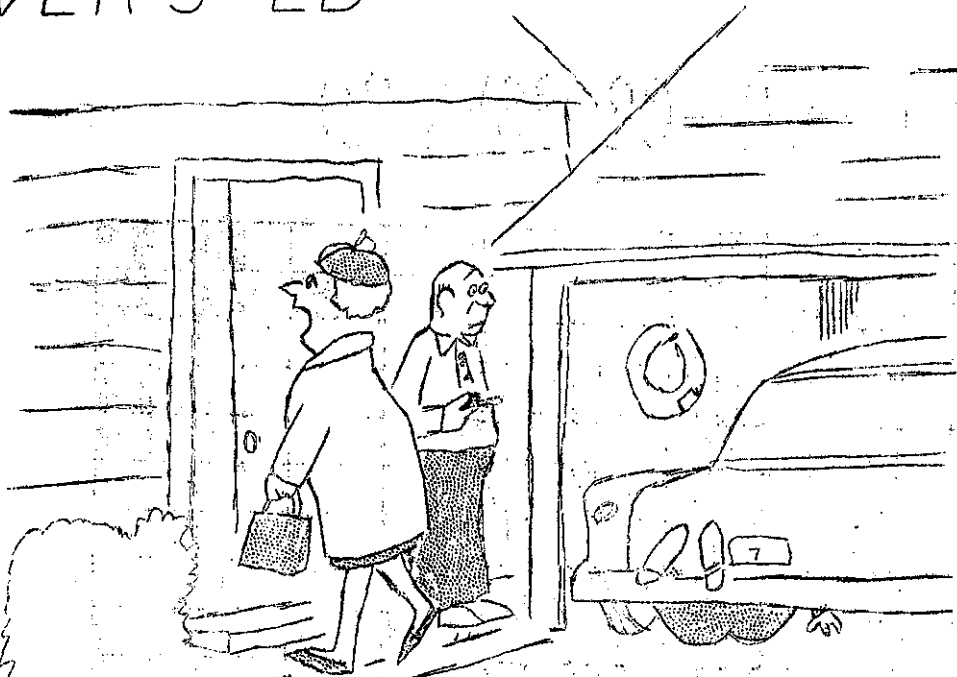

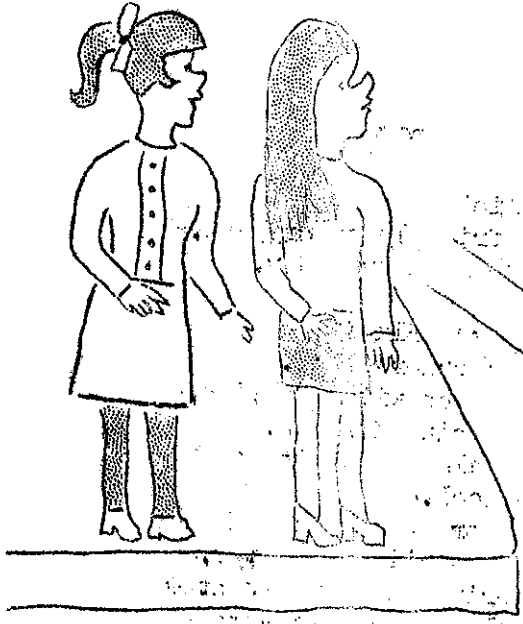
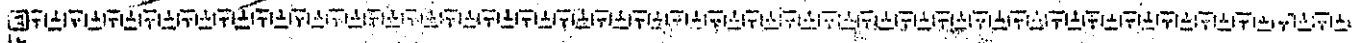
