After leaving Egypt, Danny and his wife, Arlene, journeyed to the source of the Nile and into darkest Africa.

The major part of Danny's story was filmed among the more primitive tribes of Africa, to tell a story of voodoo magic, of strange cults and customs, of witch doctors and the mad abandon of Africans dancing to the hypnotic throb of jungle drums.

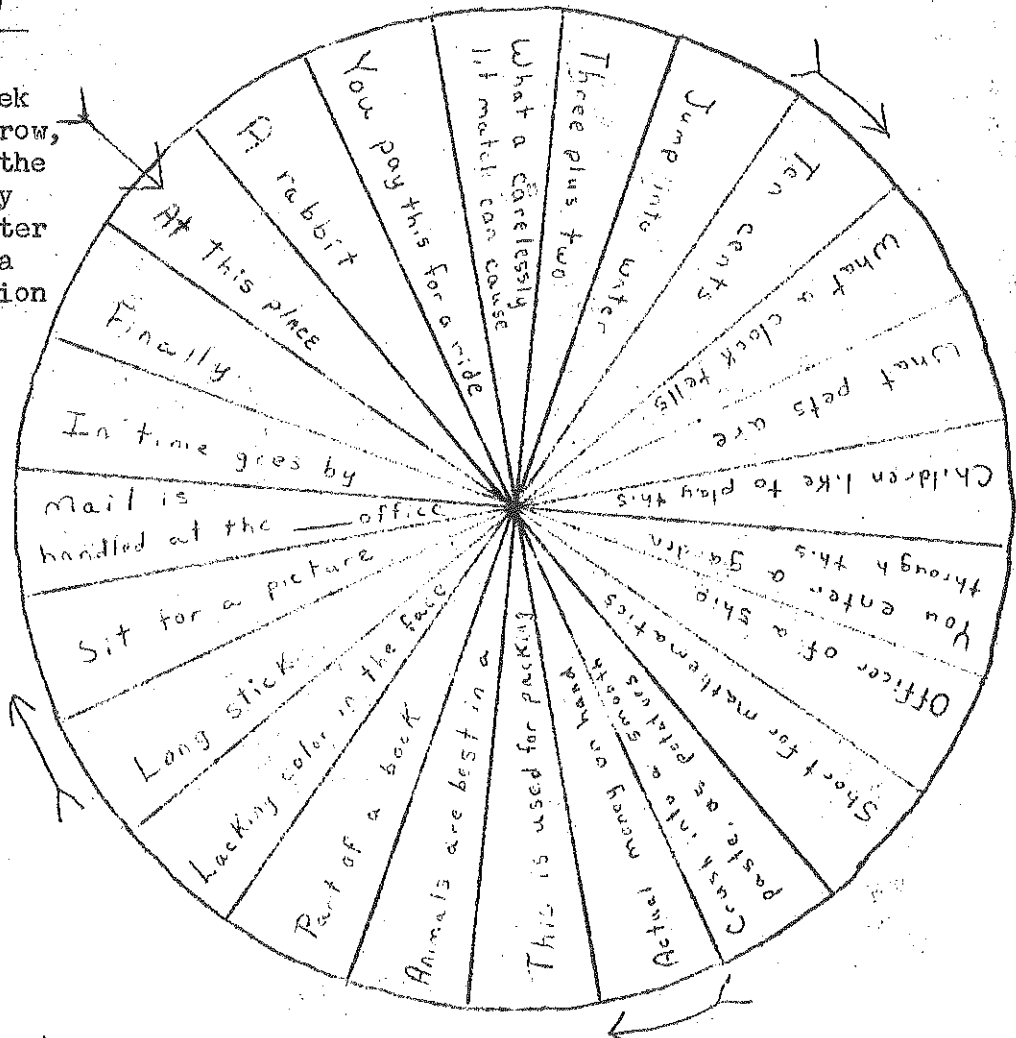

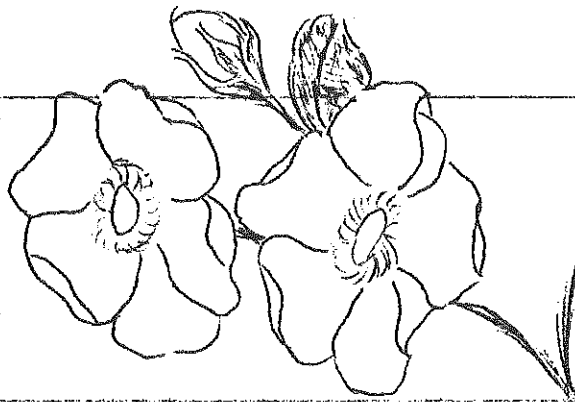
