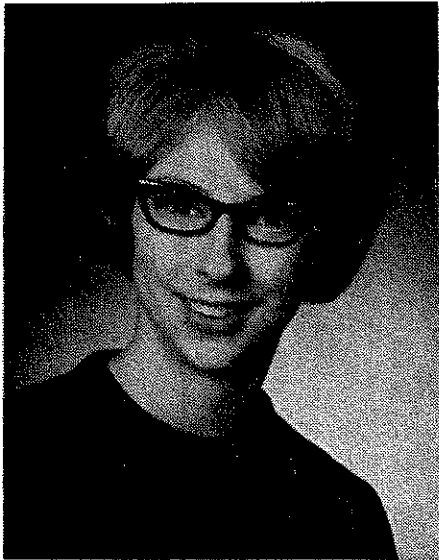

Thirty-Nine Graduate On May 22; DeVries and Vanden Hoek Win Top Honors

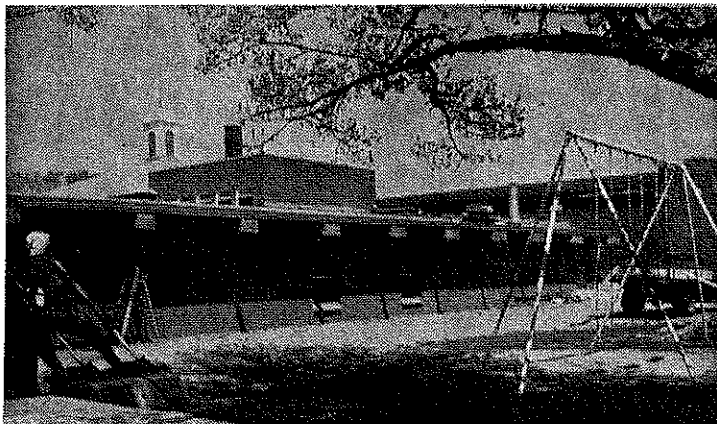

WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF COLLISIONS

1. Place flare or easy-to-see device to warn other drivers. Keep out of roadway.
2. If you know what to do, give first aid to any injured. Try not to move them. Get medical help as soon as possible.
3. Exchange names, addresses, license data with other drivers, addresses of your insurance companies. Obtain names and addresses of as many witnesses as you can.
4. Don't make statements to anyone except a law officer. Don't argue, don't get into a fight.
5. Notify your insurance company as soon as you can.
6. Report the collision to state authorities. Some localities require local police notification too.
7. Draw a diagram of the scene. Show position of cars, direction of roads, etc. Write everything down: who was involved; what, when, where, and how the collision happened. Include road and weather conditions, visibility, everything while it is fresh in your mind.

REMEMBER: Accidents don't happen; they are caused!

He has twelve years' experience teaching; eight of these have been as principal or superintendent.

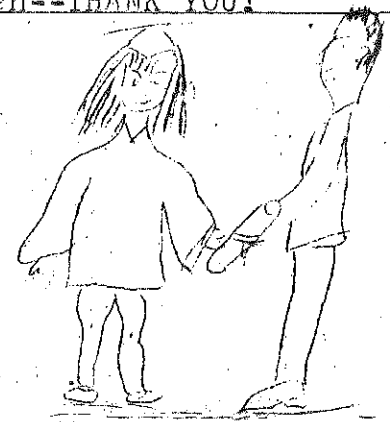
His plans for the summer include working in the summer program here in Corsica.
