Students Participate In Convention

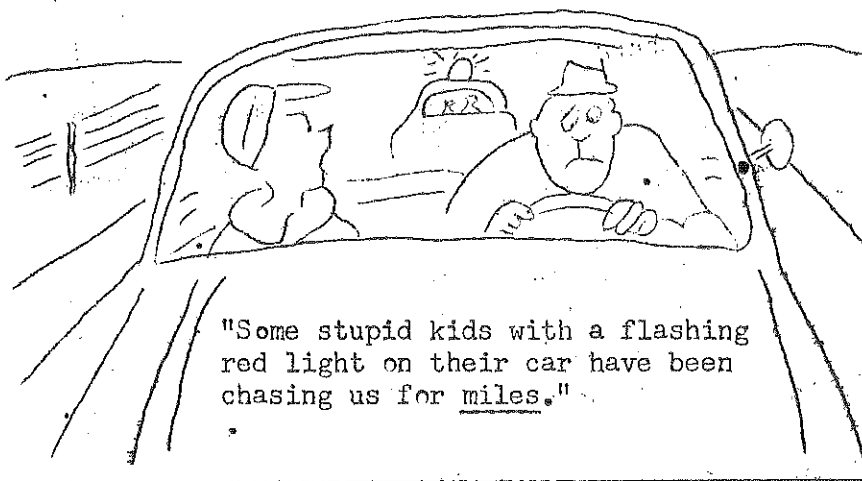

Her future plans are to marry and live in Platte.

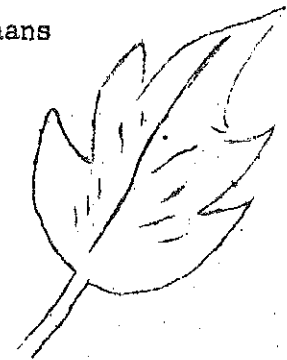

Bertram Places at Tyndall

On April 26, the track team went to Tyndall for the 36th annual Tyndall Relays. This meet is one of the biggest in the state. The two-mile relay team, composed of Dwight Bordewyk, Rob Gruenewald, Brent Beukelman, and Ronnie Vanden Berg, broke the school record in that event, covering the distance in 9:15. Doyle Bertram placed third in the 100 yd. dash. His best time, which came in the semi-finals, was 10.2 seconds, the best time this year for Doyle. Harlan Wolbrink broke the school record in low hurdles at Tyndall, running them in 21.6 seconds, but failed to place.

The next day, April 27, the track team went to the Aberdeen Relays. The weather was terrible in the morning, but it cleared up about noon. None of the boys, however, placed in any events.

Corsica Breezes to Cinder Victory

The Corsica track team had little trouble disposing of the Dakota Christian track team at Dakota on Wednesday, May 1. They were victorious by a score of 72 to 50.

Two new school records were set at the meet. Rob Gruenewald broke the old pole vault record of 9'9" by going 9'9½". Gary Hoekman high-jumped 5'3" to smash the old mark of 5', but still placed second.
