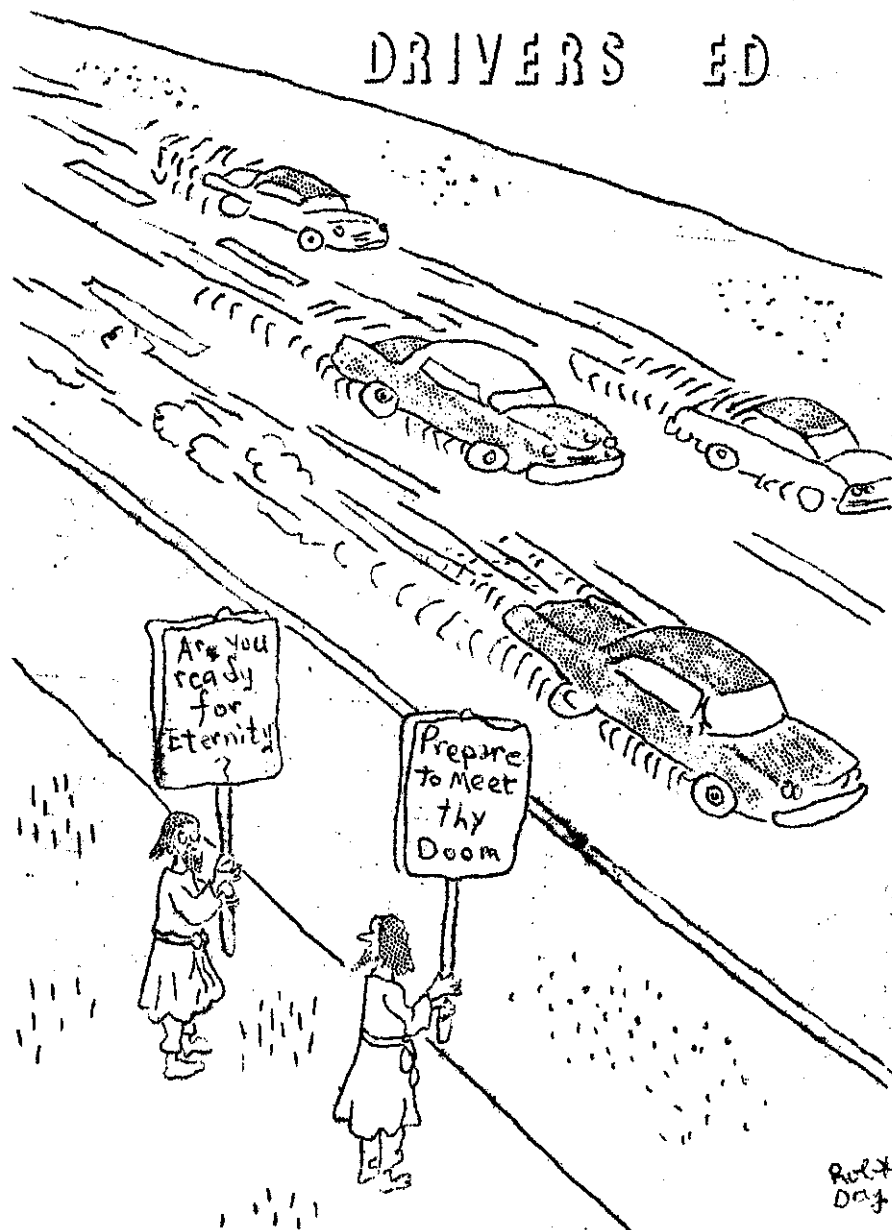

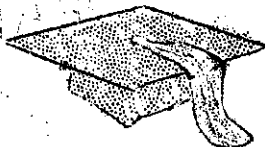
FRESHMEN NEWS

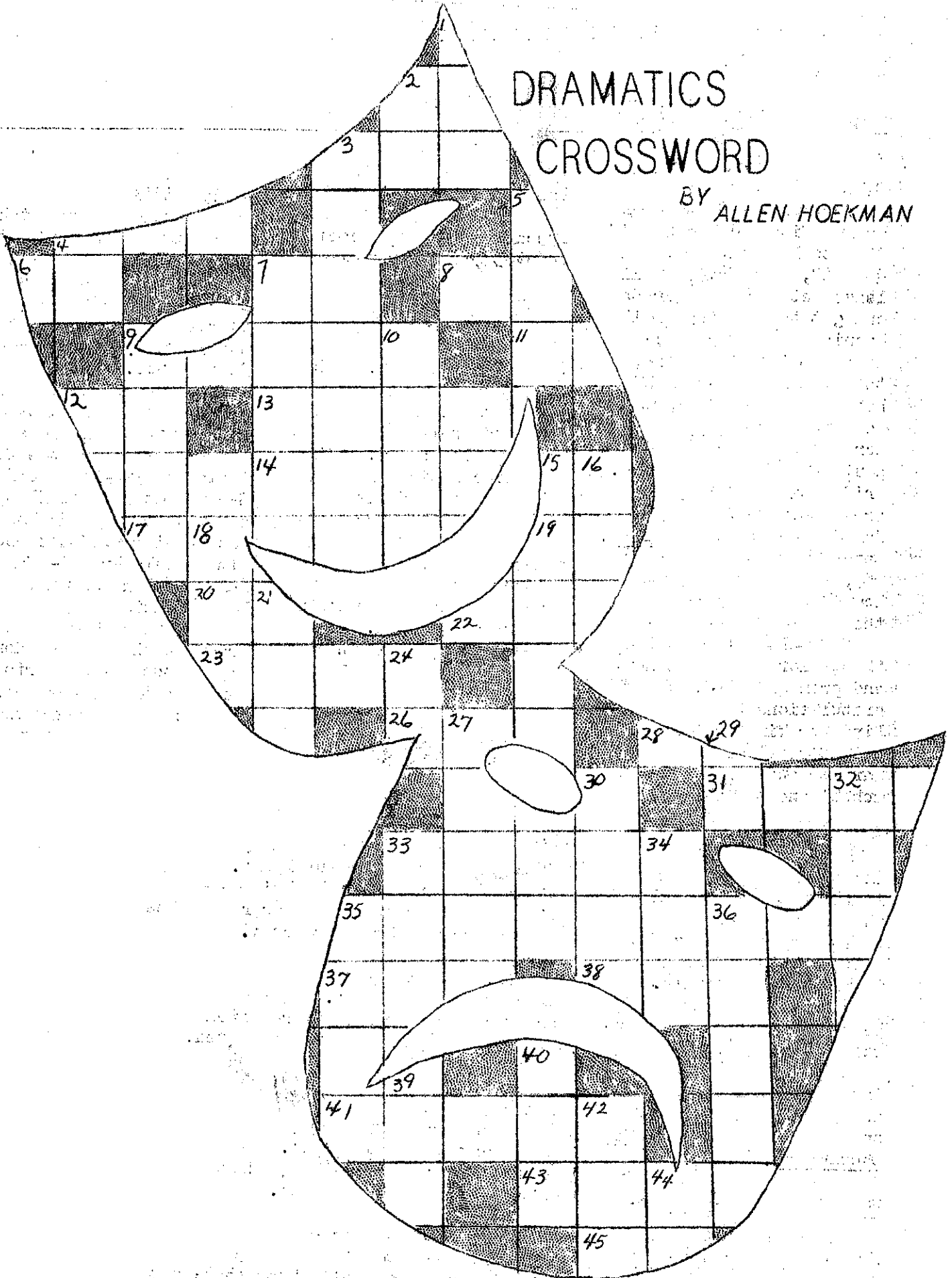
JUNIOR NEWS
