looking forward to some good results in the conference meet so they can attend the regional meet that is scheduled for May 8.

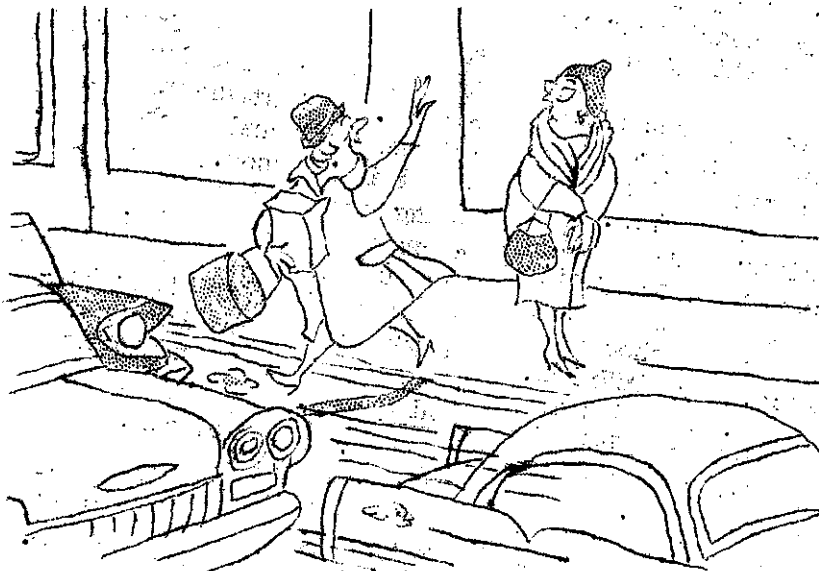
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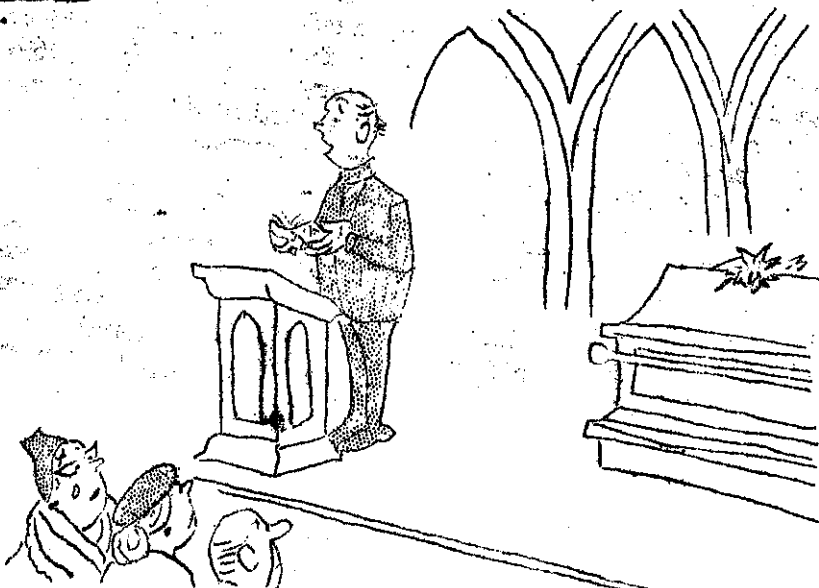

He had stated beforehand that this would be the course he would take if the issues brought such results.

France at the present is in a state of confusion politically over who will be stepping into this office. The economical and social situations seem to be holding their own thus far with only a few mishaps.

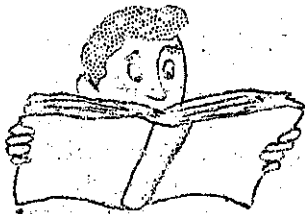

Some opinions are that DeGaulle didn't have the support of the people so it was not wise to remain in the office. Things would probably not run so smoothly as is necessary to be a strong government. Others believe his policies are too similar to those of a dictatorship and believe the system of election and term of office need altering.

Those who remain in office for long periods of time or for life terms tend to become overly attached to their office and thus form a type of dictatorship.

No matter what the opinions may be it will simply take time for France to work out its problems; then the world will note the outcome of the crisis.
