Activity plans for CHS Homecoming are complete. The Homecoming theme is "Comet Quest" which signifies that the football team is on a "quest" that may eventually bring them to THE DOME. Although the "quest" has only just begun it will take a lot of determination and hard work to see it through.

Some of the activities include dress-up days for CHS students. The best dressed person as determined by the faculty for each day will have his or her picture taken for the annual. Dress-up days for Homecoming Week are as follows: Monday - Maroon and White Day; Tuesday - Toga Day; Wednesday - Bermuda Shorts, Sunglasses, and Hat Day; Thursday - Super Hero Day (dress up as your favorite super hero); and Friday - Grub Day.

For those who do not dress accordingly for the days, they will be tried at Kangaroo Court which is part of Friday's activities at Corsica Lake.

CHS students will decorate windows on storefronts of Main Street. Prizes of \$25, \$10, and \$10 will go to the three best windows. The contest is sponsored by the Corsica Commercial Club and winners will be announced at halftime of the Homecoming game.

The remainder of Homecoming activities will be held on Friday beginning with an Activity Day (weather permitting) to be held at Corsica Lake beginning around 9:15 a.m. CHS students will be bussed to Corsica Lake after rollis taken. Activities will consist of powder-puff football, softball, and volleyball games. Classes will compete against each other by points determined for wins in each event and the class that wins will have its name inscribed on the Activity Day plaque for Homecoming in the trophy case. Kangaroo Court will be held for those who failed to comply with dress-up day. A picnic lunch will be served afterwards and students should arrive back at school around 1 p.m. at which time they (but not their cars) will be released to

prepare for the parade.

At 2 p.m. there will be a parade featuring Corsica High and Junior High marching bands, a Kiddie Parade, King and Queen of Homecoming '86, and a pep rally on Main Street. Both bands will also march by Pleasant View Home following the pep rally.

Fine food and entertainment will come together at the Community Picnic sponsored by the Lions Club at the elementary gym from 4:30 to 7:00 p.m. Music will be provided by the CHS Stage Band and Mixed Chorus beginning at 4:30. The Lucky 7 Band will not perform as previously published.

The focal point of Homecoming begins at 7:00 p.m. as the 3-0 No. 7 ranked Comets take on the visiting Kimball Kiotes. Everyone is encouraged to come out and enjoy some great football action and support their home team.

Homecoming '86 will conclude with a dance from 9:00 to 12:00 at the elementary gym with music provided by Kanaranzi Sound Systems.

The Corsica Comets came out victors again last week by defeating the Colome Cowboys, 32-6.

The Comets were not expecting the tough Cowboy defense. Corsica was held scoreless the first quarter. Trav De Lange started the scoring in the second quarter on a ten yard run. Corsica scored again in the third quarter on a ten yard Jason Broughton to Dan Bosma pass. Rob Bertram scored twice in the fourth period, from 42 and 20 yards out.

Corsica earned 338 yards on offense, 216 yards on the ground and 122 yards through the air.

Rob Bertram gained 140 yards and two touchdowns on 18

carries, while Trav De Lange had one touchdown and 63 yards on 13 carries. Jason Broughton connected on 9 of 19 passes for 122 yards.

On the defensive end, Corsica was led by Troy Bamberg with 12 stops, Trav De Lange grabbed seven, and Jamie Rexwinkel collected five and a fumble recovery. Vance Sorell grabbed an interception.

Colome scored on a ten yard pass from Zach Flakus to Craig Thieman.

This win takes Corsica to 3-0. The Comets open CBH conference play Friday when they host the Kimball Kiotes for Homecoming.
