

Magazines sales top \$1000

The classes will collect 40% of

total sales. This means that the juniors profit \$330.40 and seniors, \$151.00.

Audit report given

House will be repaired

Repairs were okayed for the school-owned house and a preliminary audit report was given at the September 18 school board meeting.

The house located just northwest of the school will have approximately \$4,300 in repair work done according to school officials and will be used as an administration or teacher residence. Earlier, school officials decided the house was not worth repairing and voted to have the house appraised and sold.

The preliminary audit report given by Mr. Gerald Pries, auditor from Parkston, showed some difficulties in the school accounts such as in a general journal and a general ledger. According to Mrs. Irma Beukelman, school bookkeeper, the ledger and journal will be kept and other difficulties will be corrected.

The audit was done for the school board's use only and will cost approximately \$1,750, according to Pries.

In other business the school approved the installation of a pay telephone in the south lobby of the school, a Special Education mileage rate of .126 per mile, and the decision to discard some told textbooks.

Seniors will take tests in November


Seniors will be taking three types of aptitude tests for college preparation.

The seniors will take the GATB Test (General Aptitude Test and Battery) in the first week in November from 2:00 - 4:00 at Mitchell Vo-Tech. After the test a tour will be given of Vo-Tech. The GATB Test is taken by students interested in a two year college program.

The ACT Tests (The American

College Testing Program) are taken by students interested in a four year program. There are different test centers and five dates for which to take the test. The test covers four areas: English, mathematics, social studies, and natural sciences.

An Arm Services Vocational Abilities Test, ASVAB, is scheduled for the morning of October 26 in the Corsica High School. It is to test the vocational ability in areas of possible employment for people entering armed services.

Bond fails

School bond election failed as 71 per cent of the registered voters in the school district voted in the bond election held last Tuesday.

The election was defeated by eight votes Of 807 votes cast, 476 voted for and 331 voted against the school bond. There are approximately 1150 registered voters in the school district.

The bond election needed 60 per cent for passage and received approximately 59 per cent.

Another school bond election can be held within six weeks if the amount of the bond is raised or

lowered five per cent according to Beukelman, **Business** Irma Otherwise, school Manager: officials will have to wait one year before holding another election for the same bond.

Bordewyk will receive honors in Brookings

All-state Journalism honors were awarded to Dave Bordewyk at the 1978 Publications Institute workshop at South Dakota State University, Brookings, June 4-16.

Bordewyk was selected by the instructors on the basis of journalism work he completed. The first week concentrated on newspaper--learning how to write stories, layout the pages and write headlines. He also wrote for the "Writer's group publications Cramo"

Yearbook techniques emphasized the second week of camp. Bordewyk said "it was really worth it since I didn't know much about it".

Total cost for the two weeks was \$170 with the school board providing all but \$20.

Connie Everson also attended the two week Journalism camp.

With a new darkroom installed in the home of Wayne Wieseler, CHS Journalism teacher, the time lost in meeting the deadline dates will not be as great. "Last year we had to wait up to two weeks to get pictures developed, but now they can be developed in two hours, Wieseler said.

"I am really happy with the annual. I think the annual is headed for an All-State Award," Wieseler said. "The layouts were excellent and very few headlines were close to poor. The pictures were good and the theme was well executed."

Complaints about the quality of the annual were few, but some did feel there was too much copy and not enough pictures, Wieseler said. Those who liked the annual, he added, were impressed with the sports scoreboard, pictures, and cover.

Large percentage vote in school bond election

The school bond election, as you already know, failed by eight votes. 476 voted for and 331 voted against the bond. The election needed 60 percent of the vote cast but received only 59 percent. There are approximately 1150 registered voters and only 807 voted.

The School Board has three options open concerning the building of a new school. First: they may raise or lower the bond by five per cent and float it in six weeks. Second: they may leave the bond the way it is and run it again in one year. Third: they may drop the plans for a new school.

People are apparently for the plan of an entire school according to the nearness of the vote. The Journalism class feels the School Board should raise or lower the bond and rerunit in six weeks. The class feels this way, because the bond nearly passed the first time and enthusiasm is still there for the new school.

As you probably have noticed already, the school newspaper has taken a foremat change for this coming year. Through the efforts of the Journalism class and School Board, new standards have been set for this publication.

The first major change was renaming the paper from "The Corsica Comet" to "The Forum". Since there was a change from mimeograph to offset printing, the editorial staff felt a name change was in order. The visual difference in the newspaper called for a new start. Another reason for the name change is that the school yearbook is also named "The Comet." It was time to distinguish between the two for the students and for state Journalism competition in Brookings.

Last year, the staff had a difficult time in publishing a decent looking paper. The mimeograph machine just wasn't dependable enough for producing a bona fide newspaper. The total cost to the school system will be approximately \$700. This is somewhere between \$400 to \$450 more than the cost last year.

The last reason for the change was the need for more class time for other projects. Last year too much time was spent on newspaper which cut into the regular class work and the production of the school annual. Since Journalism is considered an English course with credit, the Journalism Class will be able to spend more time on the study of Mass Media Theory.

With these changes, "the forum" staff hopes to produce a better newspaper that is a voice and reflection of the happenings in Corsica High School. This, in the end, is the true essence of any publication.




The clinic was held one day from 8:00 a.m. till 1:00 p.m. and the cheerleaders learned new jumps, stunts, and cheers.
