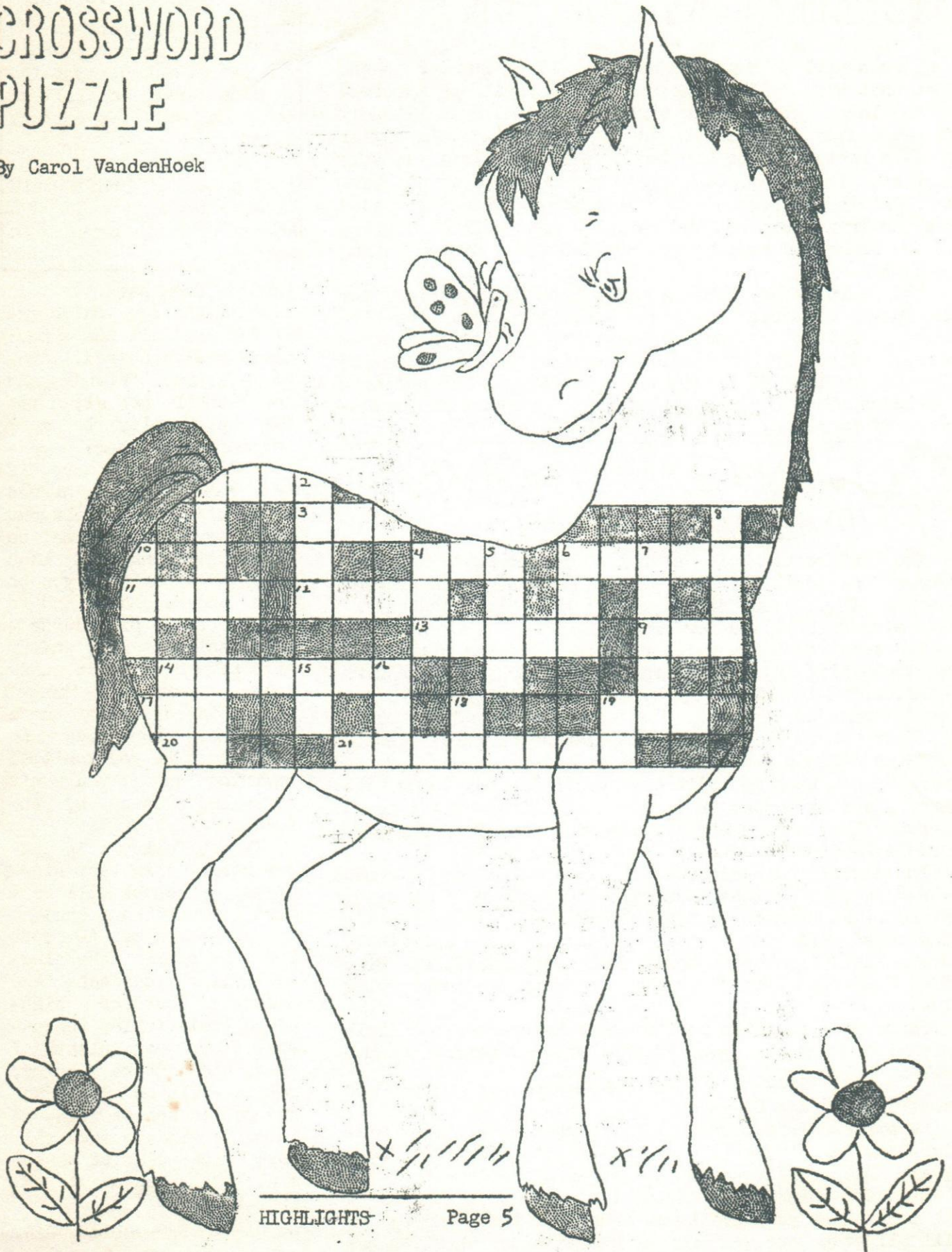

Last year we were fortunate to win two superior ratings at this contest. This year looks every bit as good, if not better! All three choruses have been coming along very good with their music. The band has also done well lately, and we are sincerely hoping, and WORKING for a higher rating this year.

The choruses are singing music from the repertory for the spring concert. Concert band selections are "Pavanne", written by Maurice Ravel; "Balletta", a contemporary number by Frank Erickson; and "Au Pays Lorrain" (In the Province of Lorraine), a portrayal of composer Guillaume Balay's personal impressions of the French province of Lorraine.

STUDENTS WILL GIVE SPRING CONCERT

The CHS vocal music students will present a spring concert on April 23, 8:00 p.m., in the high school gymnasium. The concert chorus, boys' glee club, and girls' glee club will all be performing.

The concert chorus will open the program with "From Sea to Shining Sea", an arrangement of the patriotic hymn "America." This group will present four songs of various native origins; "My Lord, What a Mornin'", and "I Couldn't Hear Nobody Pray", two American spirituals; "Kum Ba Yah", an African spiritual; and a Jewish folk song, "Hava Nagila", to be done with a group of dancers doing the "Hora", a folk dance of the Jewish nation. The concert chorus will conclude the program with Jean Sibelius' "Onward Ye Peoples".

The girls' glee club will sing two pieces: "Dear Heart", a popular tune; and the Appalachian folk song, "Every Night When the Sun Goes In."

The songs "Climbin' Up the Mountain", a Negro spiritual; "Green Fields", a contemporary folk tune; and "It's a Big, Wide, Wonderful World" will be sung by the boys' glee club.

There will also be performances by some of the small ensembles which performed at the Region V contest at Kimball in February.
