COMETS BEAT

The Corsica Comets took a close 58-57 victory over the No. 3 rated Platte Black Panthers last Saturday night at Platte.

The secret behind the Comet victory lies behind the fact that the team shot. a hot 61.9 per cent in the first half. This was boosted by the hot hands of Joe Maunders who scored 15 points in the first half which was justified by his 87.5 per cent from the field.

The Comets slowed down to a slow 30 per cent in the third quarter. Despite this jolt they were able to stay ahead due to the fact of the 13 point difference at the opening of the third quarter. Free (contid col. 2)


LOGGERS PIN COMETS

What would anyone be doing at 4:30 in the morning? Sleep would be the best idea, but not for six seniors—Doug Bordewyk, Dave Markus, Brent Beukelman, Gary Van Roekel, from CHS, and Jim Botting, Wayne VanderTuin from Dakota Christian.

These six droopy-eyed seniors along with Mr. and Mrs. Fred Luyendyk were up at that early hour last Thursday. The day for us held a visit to the Control Data Corporation. We got into Minneapolis about an hour before the tour was to be held. Not knowing that Control Data was across the street, we ate lunch at Howard Johnson.

The C.D.C. has more than 2,000 employees in its Minn-eapolis branch, and has more than 35,000 employees internationally. That was one of the first things to be told us by Mr. Alvin Kosters. Mr. Kosters is in charge of the Project Dept. part of the C.D.C. that invents and uses new techniques to get better and faster efficiency out of their computers.
