## TWENTY-SIX HAVE PERFECT ATTENDANCE

Principal Vernon Doran released the names of forty-two students who had an average of "B" or above for the first semester of the 1966-67 school year. The honor roll consists of a straight A, "A", and "B" average grouping. To be listed on the straight A honor roll a student can have no grade lower than an A for the semester. To qualify for the "A" honor roll a student must have a cumulative average of at least 2.5 for the semester. The "B" honor roll is made up of students having at least a 2.0 cumulative grade average.

Two students received a straight "A" average for the first semester. Seniors Norman Ligtenberg and Donna Dykstra received the honor of being the only two CHS students to receive all "A"'s for the first semester. Seven students in addition to Norman and Donna were listed on the "A" honor roll for the semester. 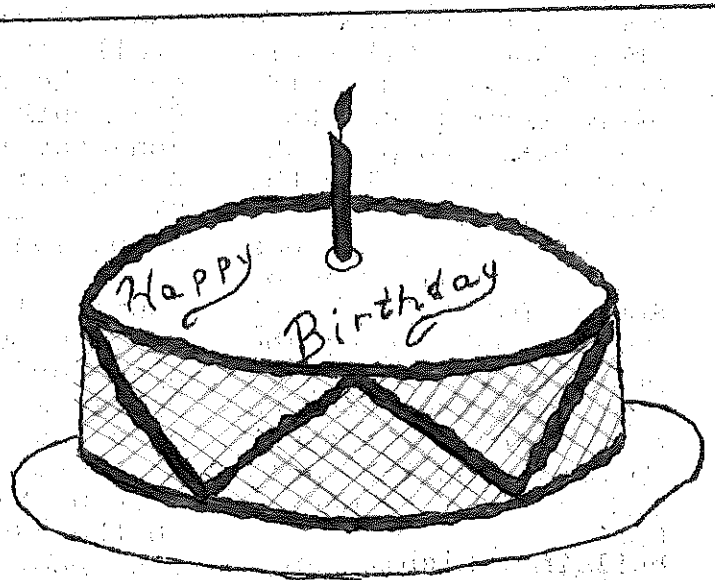

Jimmy Holm, famed animal trainer, will bring his animal show to the Corsica High School gymnasium on February 6, at 8:50 in the morning.

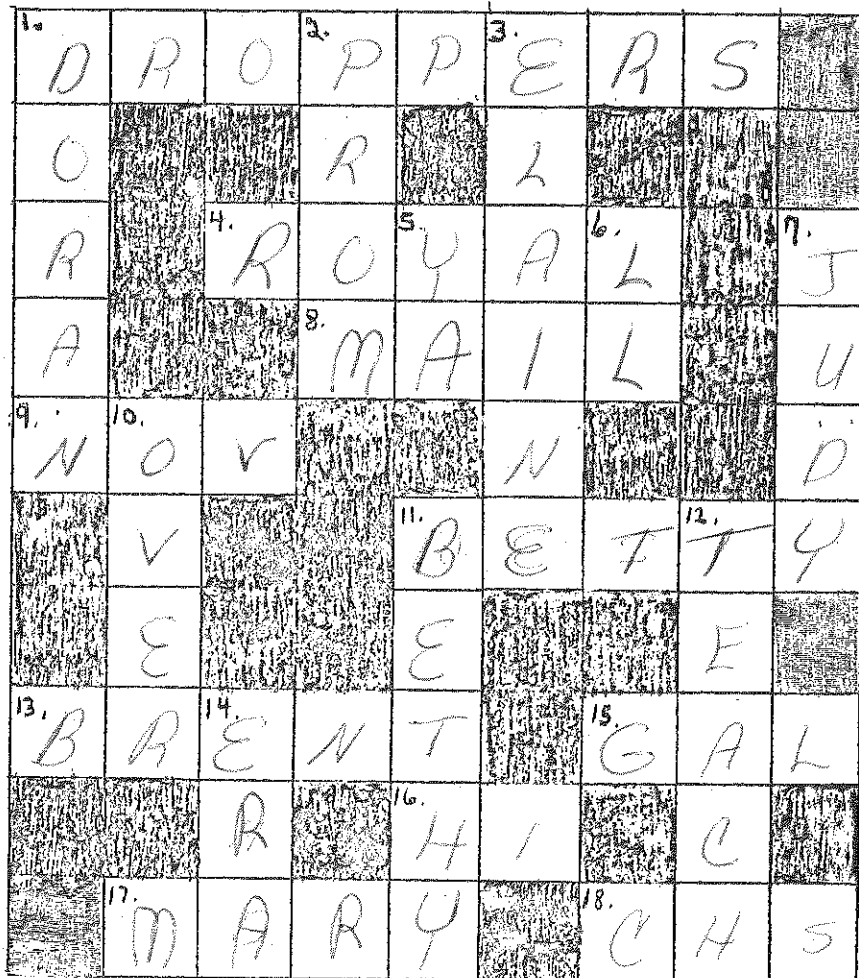
