## DRIVER'S EDUCATION CORNER

### TIPS ON WINTER DRIVING

In winter your car needs special care, So it doesn't get trapped in winter's lair. But the people who do this are very rare--- Most people put on their cars extra wear.

So driver's get "hep"  
 --Be conniving--  
 And follow these steps  
 To safe winter driving.

1. Have the cooling system flushed and put in antifreeze.
2. Have a winter tune-up.
3. Install your winter tires before the first snowfall.
4. Always carry a pair of reinforced tire chains of proper size and in good repair.
5. Make sure the defroster unit is functioning properly.
6. Be sure windshield wiper blades are in good condition and have adequate arm pressure to sweep snow and sleet off.
7. Have brakes adjusted.
8. Be certain the muffler and exhaust system are tight and not leaking.
9. Be certain headlights, stop lights, tail lights, and electrical turn signals work properly.
10. Install and use seat belts.

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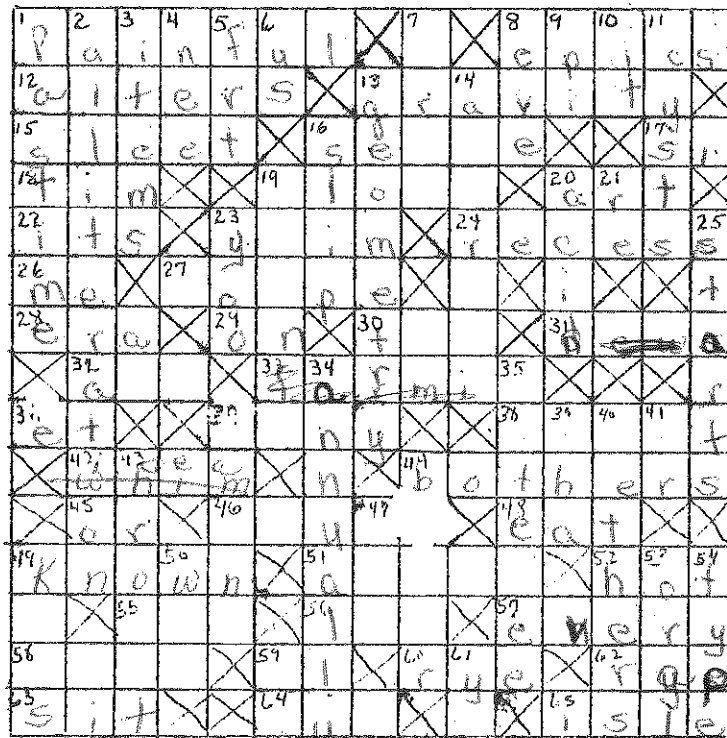
