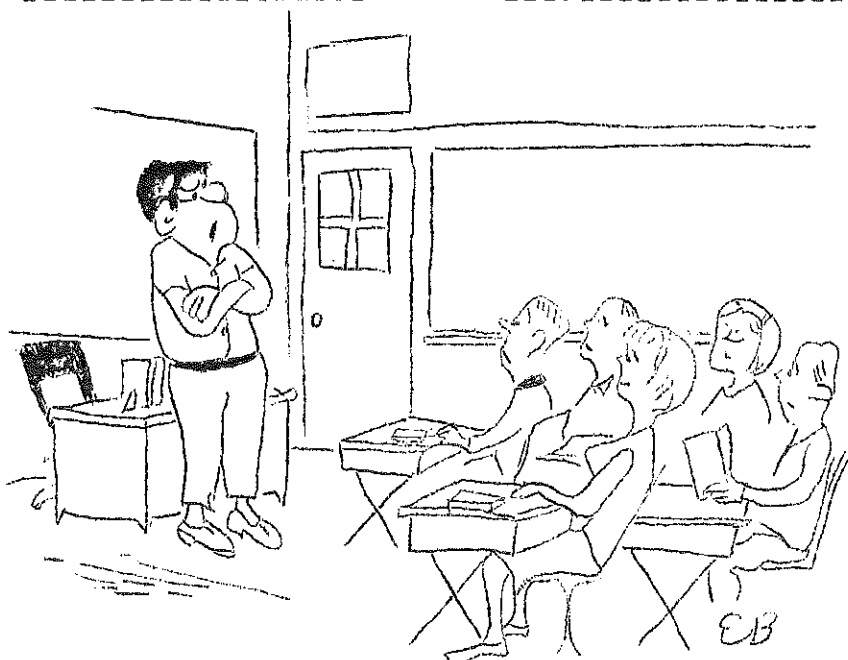
## 3rd and 4th
