NMSC HONORS MARY DE VRIES ALAN de HAAI

Letters of Commendation honoring them for their high performance on the 1967 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test have been awarded to two students at Corsica Public School, Principal Vernon Doran has announced. Those named commended students are Alan De Haai and Mary DeVries.

They are among the 40,000 students in the United States who scored in the upper 2 percent of those who will graduate from high school in 1969. The Commended students rank just below the 14,000 Semifinalists announced in September by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. (NMSC)

John M. Stalnaker, president of NMSC, said: "Although Commended students advance no further in the Merit Scholarship competition, their outstanding record in a nationwide program deserves public recognition."

CORSICA DOWNS LAKE ANDES ASSEMBLY FEATURES TRAMPOLINE

Corsica downed Lake Andes on their home field Friday, September 22, by the score of 19-6. This made Corsica the only undefeated team in the Fort Randall Conference.

Corsica started the scoring in the first quarter with a 45-yard pass from Rocky Maunders to Ron VandenBerge. The first half ended with the score 6-0.

The score was tied by the Lake Andes team in the third quarter. Late in the same quarter Doyle Bertram fought his way free to run 76 yards for a touchdown and break the tie.

The fourth quarter saw Bertram scoring again, this time with a 67 yard run. Rocky Maunders got the extra point and ended the scoring.

Bertram ran a total of 215 yards behind some good blocking by his teammates.

Defensive standouts for Corsica were Larry Bergeson, Rocky Maunders, Dan Walters, Dwight Bordewyk, and Ron VandenBerge.

On Friday, September 29, Mr. Mike Brow from Kelowna, British Columbia, visited Corsica High School to give a demonstration on a new sport called "space ball."

Mr. Brow began his program with an amazing display of gymnastics on the trampoline.

From this he proceeded to explain and demonstrate the basic drops and summersaults.

After he had showed the student body the fundamentals, he called two willing volunteers from the audience, Roger Hoekstra and Harlan Wolbrink. He then taught them a few of the drops and how to bounce on the trampoline.
