Boy, am I ever sorry I am going steady! The price I have to pay for a little fun and some lovin' with a girl I hardly even know.

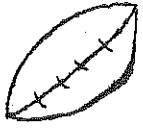

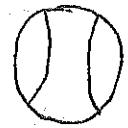

## COMETS STOP UNDEFEATED TRIPP TEAM

## CORSICA DOWNS ARMOUR PACKERS

## NEW SPORT STARTS AT CORSICA

Corsica stopped Tripp's four year winning streak September 8. The Comets last defeated Tripp in '63 and since then the Wildcats had played 29 games without a loss.

The first and second quarters consisted mainly of defensive action with neither team scoring. In the third quarter, however, Tripp sneaked by Corsica and gained a touchdown.

Corsica retaliated in the fourth quarter with a 4 yard plunge by Dwight bordewyk to tie the score. Two minutes from the end of the game, Doyle Bertram broke loose and ran 27 yards for a touchdown. The extra point by Ron Vanden Berge resulted in the final score of 13 to 0.

The whole team, led by Jay DeWaard, did an outstanding job of defense against the heavier Tripp men.

Corsica defeated Armour 22-13 on the home field on Friday, September 15.

The first quarter was a defensive battle as neither team was able to push across a touchdown.

The second quarter found Armour going scoreless again, but Corsica scored on a 55 yard pas play from Rocky Maunder to Harlan Wolbrink. Ron Vanden Berge got the extra point on a pass from Maunder. A severe blow was given to Corsica in the second quarter as Jay DeWaard was injured and will be out for the season. This hurt both offensively and defensively as Jay went both ways. The half ended with Corsica leading 7-0.

The third quarter saw both teams score as Armour scored two times on runs by Boyd Comzemius with Zeitner getting the extra point. Armour was ahead at this time 13-7. Just as the third quarter ended, Harlan Wolbrink scored on a 45 yard pass from Rocky Maunder. Ron VandenBerge got the extra point. The third quarter ended 14 to 13, Corsica.
